Nancy and Ruth Parker have terminated their visit with relatives and friends here and took their departure for their home in Seattle, Thursday morning.

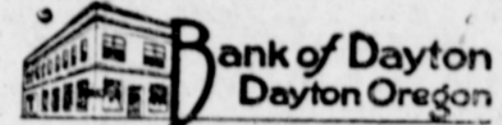
Rev. J. F. Franklin and family went to Cottage Grove, Tuesday, to attend the annual camp meeting of the M. E. Church and expect to be gone a week.
