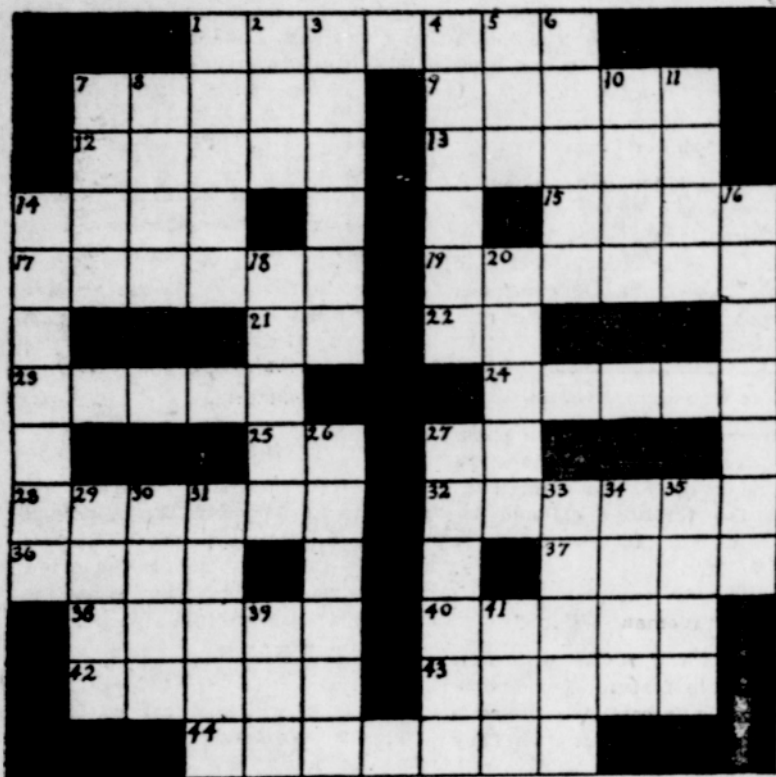

Farm Reminders

Oregon potato growers working for seed certification find it best to join the inspector in making examinations. Weak, diseased, and off-type veins are pointed out by the college extension specialists to be dug and removed from the field. Disease may otherwise be spread rapidly from plant to plant until much of the field is disqualified. Failure to do the roguing at these times will cause rejection of the field.

Cooking grains for pig feed has been shown by feeding tests at the O. A. C. experiment station to be not only of no value, but detrimental. While it may have a slight beneficial effect on the starches, cooking seems to lessen the digestibility of protein and mineral matter. Potatoes, being very starchy, must be cooked for best results. Roots are not often improved by cooking, and steaming alfalfa has not proved profitable so far at Corvallis.

Remodeling an Oregon tunnel p-pune drier to double its capacity costs less than building additional

units sufficient to double the capacity. Blue prints of the new system, worked out by E. F. Wiegand of the experiment station will be sent driermen of Oregon at \$1.50 each. The system provides for drawing the warmed air back again to be used over and over in heating and hydrating the fruit, instead of throwing it out through the stack and wasting it.

Tile lines in drainage of Oregon white lands are laid four rods apart in the experiment station plan of under drainage. The tiles have been found to draw for two rods on each side.

Bee hives well placed under Oregon conditions do not rest directly on the ground. Timbers 2 by 6 inches, bricks, or special stands are used for supports, a stand 6 inches high being the best. A sloping board is placed from the ground to the entrance to permit heavily laden bees that drop near the hive to reach the entrance.

The past week has been a lively one for new settlers in the Land Settlement Department, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. Marion county has reported 185 out of state arrivals since January, and Lane county has submitted a like list of 36 since June first. Klamath county has just sent in the names of six farmers from Bishop, California, who have bought farms in that section of southern Oregon during the past month. Nine other new settlers have been reported into the department during the past week, making a total of 236. This reaches the record of almost 1000 settlers reported through the Land Settlement Department during its period of operation, the actual figures to date being 993.
