Miss Prudence Denney went to Portland Saturday for a visit.

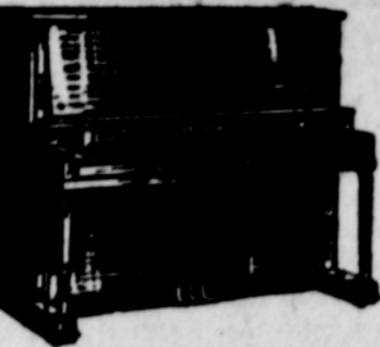
D. Nelson and wife were "picnickers" at Cascade Locks, Sunday.
