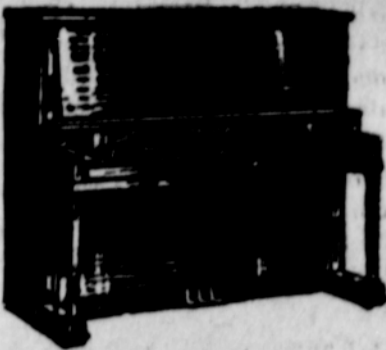

French cavalry is on your left." The Light brigade advanced straight to its front and soon came under the fire from the guns of both banks. Five minutes later the guns in front got in their fire. Only two formed bodies of the Light brigade found their way back. The brigade lost 247 men and 497 horses out of a total strength of 673 engaged in the charge which, from first to last, occupied 20 minutes.
