G. B. Foster transacted business in the county seat Tuesday.

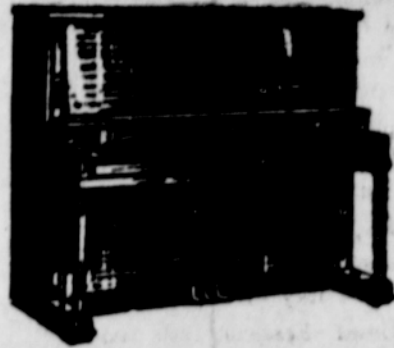
Ed. Grabenhorst and family are visiting relatives in Washington this week.
