Harvey Ross had a crew of men and boys at work last Saturday baling straw.

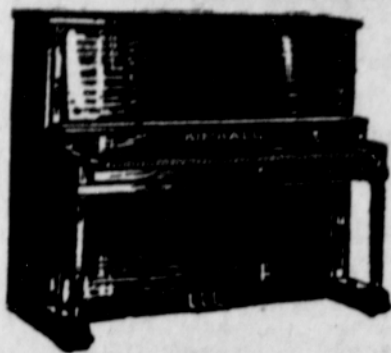

Coloring Hydrangeas

The color of the flowers of the shiny-leaved hydrangeas is variable and seems to be dependent on the acidity or alkalinity of the soil. An abundance of lime produces pink in the flowers, while blue is produced by acid conditions which may be augmented by the use of alum, rusty iron or iron filings. Too much lime will check the growth of the plants and cause a yellowing. Treatment for any effect needs to be begun a year before the result is desired.

Odd Fact About Seals

Among the Arctic fishermen February 28 is called the seal's birthday, for in the rookeries of the Far North it seems almost as if the baby seals had dropped from the sky in one shower. With unvarying regularity the baby seals appear within a day or two of that date. This is regarded as one of the amazing wonders of nature.
