University of Oregon, Eugene, Sept. 17—(Special)—One thousand and ninety-six new students have applied for admission to the University of Oregon for the fall term, a total 144 in excess of the number who applied for the fall term a year ago, and exceeding the 1923 record by 344, according to Carlton E. Spencer, registrar. The number of applications and acceptances indicate that total University enrollment for 1925—26 will be above 3,000, creating a new registration record.

As applications of new students will be accepted until registration days, Sept. 24 and 25, the total is certain to exceed 1096. Mr. Spencer says. Already the credentials of 1017 new students have been accepted by the entrance committee, of which approximately 800 are freshmen. At this time last year 843 new students had been accepted, and in 1923, 679. This year's freshman class will set a record.

The entrance committee has refused admission to numbers of applicants either because they did not meet University scholarship requirements or because, as non-residents, they could not qualify for admission to the state universities of their own states. To date, forty of the forty-three rejections have been due to this rule.

Among the new applicants is Frederick Warren Cozens, a member of the faculty of the University of California, southern branch, who will do work for the degree of doctor of philosophy, majoring in education and minoring in physical education.

The pre-registration program for freshmen calls for their appearance on the campus Monday, Sept. 21, when physical examinations will be given. The English examination is scheduled for Tuesday, and the placement examination for Wednesday. In groups of fifty, the freshmen will receive instruction in the use of the library at specified days during the week. Registration material will be released to them Wednesday, Sept. 23. On Thursday and Friday they consult their advisers and make out their courses for the year.
