Mrs. Hattie Stanley is slowly recovering from severe bruises sustained from falling from a chair on which she was standing while washing windows.

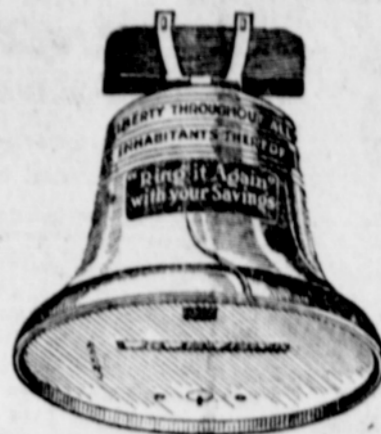
Mrs. Helen L. McDonald of Portland spent Saturday and Sunday here with her mother Mrs. H. P. Newton.
