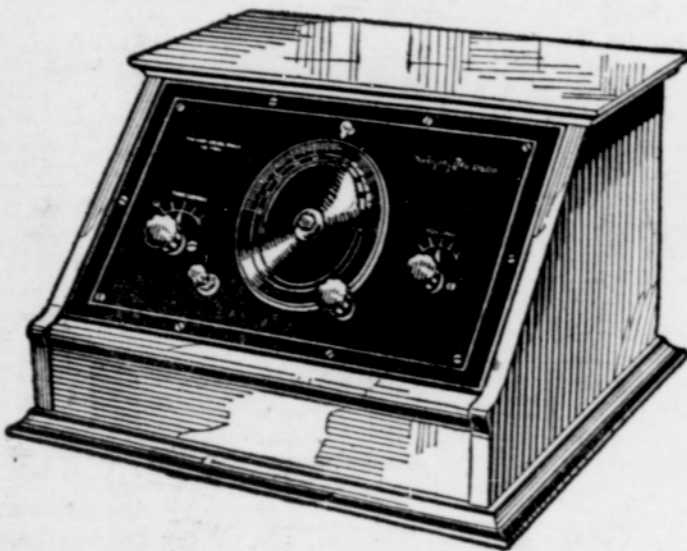

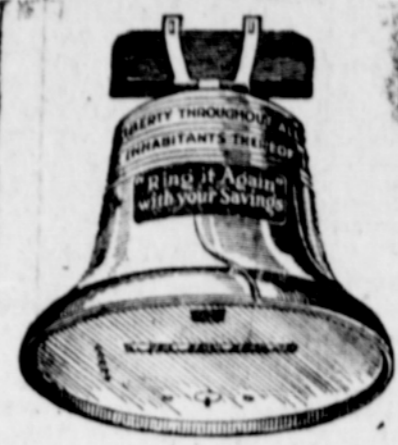
Mrs. Chas. Bailey and little son of Portland is spending the week with her parents H. G. Ogden and wife here.
