1% Award to Gore not Favored. The 1% of the money recovered by Jackson County Court to W. H. Gore of Medford for services rendered in relation to the O. & C. Tax Refund measure was recinded by Judge Hartzell of Jackson County in a statement published October 15th. In this statement Judge Hartzell says that it is very evident that this attitude concerning this payment does not accord with the desire and wishes of the majority of the citizens of Jackson County and therefore he is recalling his vote on that question. It is believed that the County Commissioner's will also withdraw their votes. Unless one of them do it will be impossible to withdraw the resolution.

The Jackson County Court sent a copy of this resolution, together with a letter requesting its adoption by Yamhill County, to the Yamhill County Court. The Yamhill County Court, however, took no action in it and the papers and affidavits necessary to recover money under this bill were sent directly to the office at Washington, D. C.

Senator Stanfield has written to the various County Courts affected by this bill requesting that the resolution be not adopted saying in part "Great credit is due to Senator Gore and his associates. They rendered a splendid public service but to force upon them a monetary reward would rob them of the greater reward of public appreciation and approval which constitutes the greatest possible compensation for public service."
