LOCAL MAN LOSES MEMORY WHILE VISITING PORTLAND

Howard Godfrey, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Frank S. Baldwin of this city, who has been spending some time here seeking to benefit his health, suffered an attack of aphasia while in Portland last week. Godfrey appealed to the Portland Post of the American Legion to aid in establishing his identity. He said he thought his home was in Oregon and that he had a wife and son, and that he believed his father was a lumberman in this state. He said he was sure he was a member of the American Legion.

While eating in a restaurant with L. R. Gilbert, secretary of the Port-

land Post, Godfrey saw the words: "Ward W. Wells, Insurance," on a calander on the restaurant wall, and his attention became so fixed on this that Gilbert called up Wells and found that he was a close friend of Godfrey. Wells immediately identified the man, stating that Godfrey's home was in Newberg and that his father is a lumberman at Wauwootsa, Minn. He took Godfrey under his personal care and he was sent to Newberg.

JUDGE RAMSEY RESUMES PRACTICE IN MCMINNVILLE

SINK HOLE AT YAMHILL SWALLOWS 15 CARS SAND AND DOZEN LOGS DAILY

The old "sink hole" north of Yamhill over which the Southern Pacific railroad passes is demanding its usual attention during the rainy season.

At present 25 men are busy trying to satisfy this greedy monster with from 12 to 15 cars of sand daily, logs or anything else that is "filling." Yet it sinks nearly two feet over night. The railroad company is allowed \$1500 this month for the purpose and already this small patch of ground has cost the company many thousands of dollars.

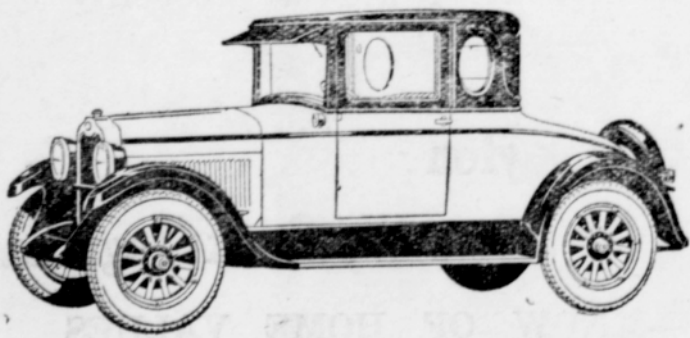
