### DIVORCE CASES FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

Two divorce cases were filed in the Circuit Court for Yamhill County this week. Henry Schildwachter of Rex asks for a divorce from Etta D. Schildwachter on the grounds of desertion without cause. He claims that she deserted him five years ago without cause or provocation. The complaint was filed April 13, 1927. L. E. Lange is the plaintiff's attorney.

Muriel Baldra of McMinnville through her attorney, R. L. Conner, filed a complaint April 16, 1927, against Chester W. Baldra for divorce on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment which rendered her life burdensome and unbearable. They were married in San Francisco, Calif., April 22, 1914, and lived together until April 2, of this year, when the defendant left their home. Mrs. Isora Berry of Tillamook is named co-respondent by Mrs. Baldra in her complaint. The plaintiff asks for the custody of their two minor sons, Donald Wesley age 12 years and Fred Maine age 10 years and \$30.00 per month for the support of the two minor children.

The meetings in this county will be held as follows: Springbrook, Wednesday, May 18; Dundee, Thursday, May 19; Sheridan, Friday May 20; Yamhill, Saturday, May 21. On these occasions, delegates will be selected for a convention of one hundred Pacific Northwest producers of dried prunes which will be held at the Oregon Agricultural College June 28 and 29. At the convention, it is hoped to formulate a program of action based upon the U. S. report. This meeting is announced by Paul V. Maris, Director of the Extension service.
