EDITORIAL NOTES AND NEWS.

THE farmers East of the mountains have completed their Summer-fallowing.

A PARTY of immigrants direct from England arrived in Washington county on the 20th ult.

The Dalles and Walla Walla, it is thought, will be connected by rail during the present year.

YAMHILL county flopped at the late election from a trifle Democratic to about 100 Republican.

A project is on foot for the construction of a ship canal from Chicago to the Mississippi river—327 miles.

THE United States sells \$800,000,000 worth of products each year, and has no ships in which to export them.

MANY Indians on the Warm Springs Reservation are cultivating crops and generally adopting the arts of civilization.

AND Congress appropriated twenty thousand dollars for the improvement of "Cheese creek" supposed to be somewhere in New Jersey.

THE Bank of France has the largest sum of money under its control of any bank in the world; it has \$400,000,000, and its rate of interest is two and a half per cent.

"Garfield and Arthur," like "Tilden and Hendricks," is a sort of un-euphonious slogan. There was music in "Hazenwheeler," and had been in "Grant-blaine."

THE Wood river country is said not to be the farming country it has been represented. Back from the streams the land is dry and gravelly, and unfit for cultivation.

ONE of our Consuls at a "ferrin" port is engaged on a novel. It would be a novel affair if one of our long line of Consuls was worth a cent to King or country.

A GANG of adventurers forged a will involving the estate of a dead millionaire, Robert Whitaker, of Pennsylvania, and were defeated in the Court of last resort, after spending seventy-five thousand dollars in Court costs.

HORACE MAYNARD, the new P. M. General, was born in Massachusetts, but has represented Tennessee in Congress a number of terms since the war. He is 66 years old, and was Minister at Constantinople when appointed to a place in Mr. Hayes' Cabinet.

HON. SANFORD E. CHURCH, the great Constitutional lawyer of New York, and Democratic politician, was sixty-five years old when he died of apoplexy at his home in Albion, in that State. Mr. Church was urged for the Presidential nomination several times.

THE Pendleton Independent fairly splits its sides over the novelty of electing one Republican Representative in Umatilla county, and that over the county division question. Down on this side of the mountains we look upon it as quite a matter of course that a Republican will sometimes be successful at the polls. Position is everything, you know.

Lake county gave Whiteaker 148 majority.

John Lunny, of Astoria, committed suicide at The Dalles by shooting himself through the head.

The Society of the Oregon Pioneers' Eighth Annual Reunion at Portland last week was a successful affair.

The demand for lumber in San Francisco is on the increase, says the Seattle Dispatch and all the mills on the Sound are running on full time.

James B. Weaver, of Iowa, received the nomination of the Greenback Convention at Chicago for President. He will probably receive fewer votes than did Peter Cooper four years since.

The Scotch capitalists represented by Mr. Wm. Reid, at Portland, are contemplating the early construction of a narrow-gauge road from the valley to connect with Central Pacific at Winnemucca, Nevada.

Portland ward politicians are just now agitated over the city election soon to come off. Mr. L. Besser, better known as "Boss" Besser, is charged with having got away with the Republican city Convention.

The now famous trotter, "St. Julian," stands at the head of the turf of the world, having made the mile in 2:15 3/4. "Dexter" stood at the head for a while, but his time has now been beaten by "Rarus" and "St. Julian" and tied by "Hopeful."

COOS COUNTY ITEMS.

Four children in the family of Mr. Messer, of the Coquille, have died of diphtheria.

They have raised \$200 coin in Marshfield with which to promote the Celebration July 4th.

Mr. S. R. Dement of the Coquille, has imported a full-blood Durham bull and heifer.

Capt. C. H. Butler has made one hundred and thirty trips to Coos Bay on steam vessels.

Judge Watson held an adjourned session of Court at Empire City after he returned from this county.

Siglin, Lane, Price, Dyer, and Lamb, Democrats, were elected in Coos, though the county is Republican by 20 majority.

John Ragsdale, who was beaten by Wells, has recovered a judgment, says the Mail, in the justice's Court for \$250 00 for his injuries.

A correspondent of the News scouts the idea of connecting the Coquille with Coos Bay by means of a canal, claiming that the river is lower than the bay, and that therefore the bay would empty itself into the river.

Fred. Schetter, Postmaster at Empire City, was elected County Treasurer in the face of the Constitutional fiat making him ineligible. The question up there is, "Who is County Treasurer?" The chances are that Morse, the present incumbent will hold until his successor is (legally) elected and qualified.
