SWEET ON THE FOREIGNERS.

It would be amusing if it were not disgusting, to note with what honeyed phrase the foreign element is being written up just now in partisan Republican journals; the Irish are the especial objects of this class of false pretense scribblers. Labored editorials are vouchsafed all over the country to the point of showing that Irish-Americans are cutting loose from the Democratic party; and why they should abandon that party. When it is known that these political quacks walked straight out of the Know-Nothing camp into the Republican fold only a few years ago, and that, except during some important political campaign they never let an opportunity pass unimproved to slander and belittle foreigners generally and the Irish and Catholics in particular, it becomes an interesting problem how they are capable now of mustering the insufferable check to invite foreigners into their meshes. The San Francisco Argonaut we notice is just now exceeding sweet on the Irish. Less than a year and a half since that paper had this to say concerning the Irish and "Dutch:" "This mob of discontents is mostly Irish. It is from the Irish that a large per centage of our criminals and vagabonds come. This labor agitation has now very nearly resolved itself into an Irish riot. Nearly all the mobs and riots in the United States have been Irish. The Irish afford us our worst political element.

The Irish contribute more than their fair proportion to prisons, jails, and pauper-houses. A majority of our tramps are Irish. If we could have our way we would form a Native American political party, to co-operate with which we would invite all respectable, tax-paying foreign-born citizens. Nothing is further from our desire than to exclude the foreign born from enjoying the privileges of our laws and all the protection of our Government; but we chafe under the insolence and audacity of foreigners who come here to direct the policy of our Government, and precipitate themselves into the control of our political affairs. This feeling extends to Germans, who are especially insolent in their endeavor to direct educational matters; to Catholics, when we see their priests logrolling in the lobby of our Legislature; to Jews, who are thrusting themselves into small offices in order that Jerusalem may be conciliated upon election day. But of all office-seeking, officious, party meddling political mendicants, the Irish are the very worst. Politics seem to be a natural pursuit to an Irishman. He takes to it as a duck does to water. Only think of it—five Murphys in the Legislature! and out of ten Senators from San Francisco, six Irishmen, one Englishman, one Kentuckian and two Americans. Irish in the State, city, and township offices. Irish on the police, Irish everywhere; in fact, there is only one office in America that the Irish do not aspire to. This is the more insupportable when we bring to mind the fact that so many agitators, criminals, and paupers are from the same family."

"It used to was" that the Democratic papers made faces at Ben Butler the "Beast." Now, the Republican papers out Herod Herod in this business. They say he stole spoons, and that he voted 60 times for Jeff Davis at Charleston. Verily, politics make strange bedfellows. For instance, Geo. H. Williams bellowed himself hoarse on the stump in this State in favor of the extreme State Rights views of the then extremists, and now we find him traveling over the same ground to tell the people that the doctrine of State Rights is an abominable heresy, and always was.

Mrs. Duniway made a speech before the Legislature on the question of submitting an amendment of the Constitution to the popular vote of this State, striking the word "male" out of the suffrage clause. If the proposition should be successful before this Legislature, and be ratified by the next, it would then be submitted to the people at the general election next ensuing.
