THE VOTE IN THE SENATE.

In order to preserve in the columns of THE POST a most important record, we print the vote on the final passage of the Chinese Bill:

Ayes—Bayard, Beck, Cameron of Wisconsin, Call, Cockrell, Coke, Fair, Farley, Garland, Gorman, George, Hale, Harris, Hill of Colorado, Jackson, Jones, Jones of Nevada, Miller of California, Miller of New York, Morgan, Pugh, Ransom, Saunders, Slater, Teller, Vance, Vest, Voorhees, Walker—29.

Noes—Aldrich, Allison, Blair, Brown, Conger, Davis of Illinois, Dawes, Edmunds, Frye, Hoar, Ingalls, Lapham, McDill, McMillan, Morrill—15.

Thirty-two Senators were absent about all of whom were paired, so that had they been present, the bill would have been carried by about the same majority.

BALDWIN'S SENTENCE.

Speaking of the sentencing of cashier Baldwin to 15 years hard labor, the New York Sun thus discourses:

The course which Baldwin's case will probably take is illustrated by the application to Governor Long of Massachusetts on Wednesday for the pardon of Charles P. Strickney of Fall River, who was convicted of embezzling \$60,000 and sentenced to imprisonment for five years. The petition in his favor bears the signatures of prominent men from all parts of the State, and a stronger effort in behalf of a convict has seldom been made.

How does it happen that these applications are made so often in aid of criminals who cannot urge ignorance or want, or low and degrading associations, to extenuate their wrongdoing, and so seldom in behalf of those who could truthfully appeal to such influences as a partial excuse for their crimes?

Mr. Baldwin's family has property, says the report of the proceedings in court, "and he will lack none of the comforts permitted to prisoners." The truth seems to be that wealth and social standing still have the power, in spite of our boasted equality in the administration of justice, both to soften and to shorten imprisonment.

Senator Farley of California had added to the Chinese Bill this provision:

"That hereafter no State Court or Court of the United States shall admit Chinese to citizenship, and all laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed."

This clause was adopted by only three majority in the Senate, which shows that the 22 Republicans who antagonized it are in favor of Chinese suffrage.

Kalloch was acquitted on the evidence of two witnesses who swore six shots were fired. These two witnesses have since been sent to the Penitentiary for perjury. Thus the same testimony that cleared a murderer convicted the perjurers.

Congressman Houck has introduced one hundred and nineteen bills this session.

Poor Cadet Whittaker has had a hard time of it. He had his ears hacked up and was discharged from the military school on the charge of having done the mutilating himself. He was reinstated by a higher Court, however, but it seems the powers that be at West Point were determined to be rid of the poor negro for the Secretary of War has just issued a special order, discharging him on the recommendation of the Academic Board, because of his deficiency in his studies.

Placards have made their appearance on the deadwalls of St. Petersburg declaring that "Alexander III. is now condemned to death definitely and without appeal, as he is the incarnation of all the horrors of autocratic government."

The Czar, has not, it would seem, been delt kindly with by the Empress for his little flirtation with a circus rider, for, besides reading him the regulation "riot act," she has threatened to retire to Denmark will her children.

The court house in Yakama county was entirely destroyed by fire on the first of April, and as no safe was provided, all of the county records were lost.

San Francisco has a man who will attempt aerial navigation with a flying machine of his own invention which he calls the aerofane.

Miss Maggie Hamilton, of San Francisco, and at one time of Oregon, was married in Paris on the 29th ult., to Sir Sidney Waterlow.

Jno. Killea killed his wife in San Francisco on the 30th ult., drunkenness and jealousy prompting the act.

Delaware has recently enacted a whipping post law. Forty lashes is the regulation dose.

A dispatch dated Apr. 1, says General Streetukof, public prosecutor of the Kieff military tribunal, was shot through the head and instantly killed while sitting on the boulevard here to-day. Two assassins, who were stopped while fleeing from the scene in a carriage, offered violent resistance with their revolvers and pignard, and wounding three persons, but were finally overpowered and conveyed to the police station. The Czar, on being apprised of the murder of General Streetukof, ordered the two assassins who were arrested to be executed within 24 hours. They were accordingly hanged at Odessa.
