HAVE YOU REGISTERED?

In order to be able to vote on election day, November 5, every citizen of Port Orford must be a registered voter here before October 5. Residents of this city may complete their registration at the office of C. W. Noyes, local attorney.

Besides the national and state elections, in which there is more than the usual interest this year, there are positions in the Port Orford city administration to be filled by the voters. These are as follows: Mayor, treasurer, recorder, and three aldermen.

The charter of this city provides for the nomination of candidates as follows: "Section 5. NOMINATIONS. The manner of nomination of all elective officers shall be by petition or nomination certificate, and shall so far as practicable conform to the general laws of the state of Oregon in force at the time governing nominations made by individual electors, excepting as herein otherwise provided or as may be hereafter prescribed by ordinance but certificates of nomination shall state only such facts as are required by this Charter or the ordinances of the city, and the following: 1. The name of the candidate; 2. The office for which he is a candidate; 3. His place of residence, with the street and number thereof, if any. Each petition must be for but a single candidate for but one office. Every such petition to be effective must be properly signed by at least twenty-five qualified voters, and must be filed with the Recorder not more than thirty and not less than ten days before the election."

Section 4 of the city charter also provides that candidates must have resided for at least one year in the city, be a legal voter of the state of Oregon, and own taxable real property within the city limits at time of the election.

The city election this fall is bound to be hotly contested. With so much interest apparent and so many vital issues at stake, we believe that it is the duty of every resident of the city to vote in the coming election.

You cannot vote unless you are registered, and you will have until October 5 to register.
