DEATH TAKES WELL KNOWN STOCKMAN

(From Western World)

Coos county lost one of its well known pioneer ranchers Saturday morning when J. F. VanLeuven of Bear creek passed away at the Coquille hospital following a 10-day illness of pneumonia. The end was quite unexpected as Mr. VanLeuven had been in apparent good health until he took cold while riding the range on his place, assisting with the shearing of sheep. He was as active as always and his death came as a surprise to his many friends and acquaintances.

John Franklin VanLeuven was born on the large cattle ranch which he owned on Bear Creek, east of Bandon, February 16, 1881. He was 60 years, five months, 13 days of age at the time of his departure.

Mr. VanLeuven was a former president of the Coos county Livestock association, a member of the board at the time of his death, and an active worker in land classification in Coos county. He had lived all his life at Bear creek with the exception of a few years in Alaska in the gold rush days of '98 aboard the Mizpah, in which his mother, Mrs. Rosella VanLeuven had an interest. The Mizpah, financed by Bandon capital, was built on a lagoon at Bandon.

Both he and the widow, Mrs. Elizabeth VanLeuven, the former Elizabeth Haga, are members of pioneer Bear creek families.

Surviving besides his widow are his mother, at Coquille; two sons, Willis of the North Bank road, and Raymond of Bear creek; a daughter, Mrs. Rose Prewitt of Waldport; a brother, Horace, of Tacoma, Wash., and two sisters, Mrs. Rose Clinton of Coquille and Mrs. Laura McDuffee of Bandon.

Graveside services with the Masonic ritual were conducted by Floyd Summers of Myrtle Point. Worthy Master of the lodge of that city, assisted by members of the Bandon Lodge and largely attended by members of the organization, at the Knights of Pythias cemetery in Bandon Monday, August 4.

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET NEWS

The general market on good to choice 175 to 215 lb. hogs was at \$12.50 but two outstanding lots of truck-ins made \$12.60 and a few late sales ranged down to \$12.35, off grades selling at \$12.25 down. Weights from 230 to 270 lbs. bulked at \$11.75 to 12.00 with heavier weights downward to \$11.25. Light lights usually sold around \$11.50 to \$11.75. Packing sows brought \$9.75 to 10.50 with heavy weights downward to \$9.50 and below. Good to choice feeder pigs went at \$11.00 to 11.50. There were less than 1,200 hogs on sale with total unloads estimated at 1900 head.

The carlot steer top advanced to \$12.00, that price taking a lightly sorted load of 923 lb. weights and a small lot of truck-ins. Other good fed steers sold from \$11.25 to \$11.85, a load at the outside weighing 972 lbs. A few short feeds and some weighty steers sold around \$10.50 to 11.25 with a few light grass steers at \$10.00 to \$10.25.

Good to choice spring lambs sold about 25¢ lower at \$9.25 to \$9.50 with a few selected truck-ins and one long haul carload at \$9.75. Feeder lambs continued to sell dependably at \$8.25 to 8.50 with only off grade and underweight lambs downward to \$7.50. Yearlings sold around \$6.00 to 6.50. Fat ewes brought \$4.00 to 4.25 with common grades down to \$2.00.

SHEEP: Good to choice spring lambs \$9.25 to 9.50 a few 9.75 with one load of Eastern Oregon at 9.75; medium to good 8.75 to 9.00; common 8.00 to 8.50. Slaughter ewes good to choice 4.00 to 4.50. Feeder lambs, good to choice, 8.25 to 8.50. Shorn lambs, 8.00 to 8.60.
