Preparing To Give Aid To Prospectors

The Southwestern Oregon Mineral association is prepared to extend every possible aid to prospectors and owners of mining claims that may be brought to the attention of the proper authorities in view of securing development. This point is emphasized in by-laws adopted by the association at a meeting held at the Legion hall in Bandon Tuesday evening.

The first step is to secure the co-operation of the county courts, the chambers of commerce, the state mining bureau, and other agencies directly interested in development of resources. A meeting was set for Tuesday, Nov. 25, for the court house at Coquille when a committee from the association will meet with the court and Dr. Earl Nixon, or his assistant, of the state bureau of mineralogy.

The court will be asked to appoint one county official, probably the county assessor, to act as executive secretary of the association and to take charge of a permanent mineral display that is planned to be maintained at the court house. J. W. Hildebrand of Marshfield has offered to furnish a glass sample case and J. A. Stankovich of Bandon has agreed to bring in at least 25 ore samples for the display.

Complete information is to accompany each sample.

What has been done by the state department of geology and mineral industries in the southwestern Oregon district was explained by Ray C. Treasher, field geologist connected with the state assay laboratory at Grants Pass, who was called on by President R. J. Hillstrom.

It was explained that in order to warrant the state or federal government spending money to make assays or investigations of ores or mining prospects, specific samples and all possible information concerning them, including probable extent of deposits, accessibility, etc., must be had. The people's money cannot be spent in making "wild goose chases".

In order to get the information desired by public officials, as well as private interests who might aid development, the association decided to devote its major attention at this time to securing samples and information on ore deposits. The samples will be analyzed for the association by the state assay office at Grants Pass.

The next meeting of the association will be held at Port Orford December 16, at which time Secretary of State Earl Snell and other officials are expected to be present.
