## Editorial

### CURRY COUNTY DEVELOPMENT

Curry county, with its wonderful array of rich natural resources awaiting but the hand of man to be turned into profitable commercial channels, presents an inviting field for investment capital, and such capital is welcomed. At the beginning of the New Year it is well to give consideration to the county's development, as 1929 promises to see same go forward with a considerable impetus. One of the major matters is to place this development on a firm foundation so that not only will the investor receive adequate returns on his investment, but, also, so that the development will be of a permanent and lasting nature free from any flare backs due to ill-conceived promotion schemes, or schemes deliberately designed to separate the public from their money without giving any adequate return therefor. To make safe investments requires inquiry on the part of the investor to determine the merits of the project, and worthy projects will stand such investigation. Many a meritorious project has failed by reason of intentional or unintentional inefficient management. Citizens should encourage developments that can withstand such inquiries and should look with suspicion on those which cannot.

The future of Curry county is bright and thoughtful citizens should take a hand in guiding its development so that the county will receive the full and lasting benefit therefrom.

### LIFE SAVING STATION

In 1891 congress authorized an investigation to determine the advisability of the establishment of a life saving station at Port Orford, and 1910 the coast guard service purchased a tract of land near the present dock from the Hume estate as a site for such a station, but, for some unknown reason, the deed has never been placed of record. As nearly 20 years elapsed between the time of the congressional authorization and the time of the purchase of the tract of land, it would seem that it is now time to authorize the establishment of the station as another 20 years has nearly rolled around since the purchase. Oregon's congressional delegation is active in the matter at this time and this much deserved recognition may be realized.

Coquille, Dec. 21.—Henry Lorenz of the Lorenz Dry Goods store that was robbed here about three weeks ago said here today that he would not go to Portland to identify the second man questioned as to the holdup.

Harvey Miller, formerly of this locality, was caught wearing one of the leather jackets robbed from the store and was selling goods stolen here. He confessed to the robbery and to selling some goods in Coos county before going to Portland.

Miller was accompanied by a man wearing a new suit and new shoes. It was this man that Frank Osmond, chief deputy sheriff, wanted Henry Lorenz to identify. Mr. Lorenz, feeling that he could not swear as to the certainty of the suit having been taken from his store, decided last evening that he would not go to Portland, but telephone to Frank Osmond the make of shoes and suit that had been taken from the store.

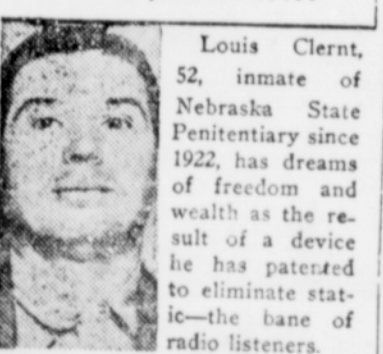
It is believed by Mr. Lorenz that Miller has been conducting systematic robberies of this kind here and in Portland and selling the goods stolen in the other town.

### "CATCHING COLDS" COSTLY

Colds cost the citizens of Oregon over three millions of dollars annually. The population of Oregon is about eight hundred thousand. Assuming that 40 per cent of the population are wage earners earning an average of five dollars per day, missing work two days due to colds represents a loss approximately of three million dollars yearly. All this loss is the result of a condition which is to a great extent preventable.

Fifty per cent of all absences lasting from one day or more is due to colds. In addition to a loss of time, colds cause inefficiency. It is not possible for a person suffering with a cold to concentrate on his duties.

In spite of the different climates, there is a similarity in the occurrence of colds throughout the country.

The common cold is the most frequent of all acute infections. Colds are not usually considered a serious matter. However, the total cost of colds computed in terms of time lost, inefficiency, doctor bills, medicine, is greater than for any other disease. Its complications such as pneumonia, nephritis, heart and other organic diseases, make it a more important infection than tuberculosis or any other infectious disease. Colds are usually infections of the nose, throat, or bronchi. The infection is usually spread by direct infection from persons having colds. Sputum from individuals having colds is cast on the ground or floor and dried, and its contained germs are swept or blown about. Colds, while they are

strictly infectious, are brought on by accessory factors.

These accessory factors are:

1. Over-heated and uneven room temperature.
2. Lack of sufficient humidity.
3. Chilling or wetting of the feet.
4. Fatigue and lack of sleep.
5. Overeating and an improper diet.
6. Defective air passages, diseased tonsils, adenoids, and sinus infections.
7. Faulty elimination.
8. A run-down condition with a special susceptibility to catching cold.
9. Presence of an epidemic of colds that are highly infectious.

### State Bank Ruling

Portland, Dec. 27.—The ruling made Monday by the state superintendent of banks, A. Schramm, relative to bank corporations, is still causing considerable comment in banking circles over the state. It was indicated here today by opinions expressed by local heads of financial institutions. The ruling has received the support of the majority of bankers over the state, a preliminary survey reveals.

The state superintendent of banks, with the approval of the state banking board, made a ruling that prohibits state banks affiliated with bank corporations from making loans to the parent corporation if the latter controls directly or indirectly, or has option to purchase 25 per cent or more of the stock of the loaning bank.

The ruling, Schramm said, will cover all Oregon banks that are affiliated with bank corporations. It applies also to trust companies that are so affiliated, and to any holding company, copartnership, association or corporation that is a parent organization.

### Engineer to Leave

Larry Smitten, the last of the state highway engineering staff to remain in Gold Beach has been notified to hold himself in readiness for orders to move elsewhere. He probably will receive definite orders soon after New Year, and he is of the opinion that he will be transferred to the bridge department to work in the Klamath Falls district.

Mrs. Smitten will remain here for the present, but later she may join her husband wherever he may be located.

Mr. Smitten has been here for several years during which time he has been engaged in highway engineering work. During the past year he has had charge of maintenance work and he has also served

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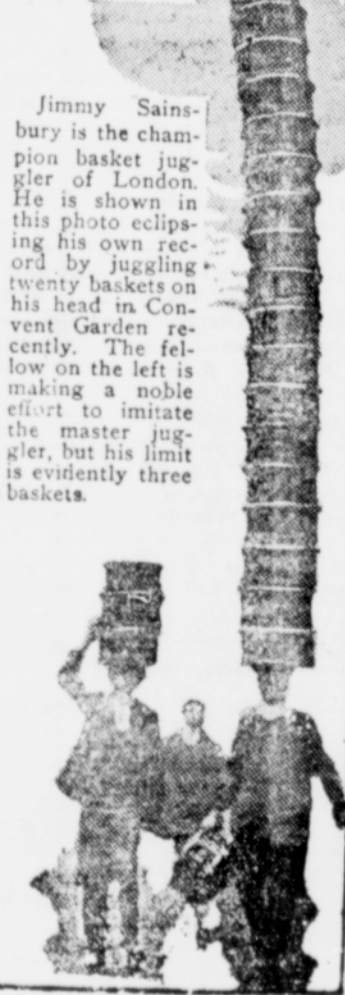
