ARE SEA LIONS DESTRUCTIVE OF FOOD FISH?

This great question is at issue, and upon its proper determination depends whether our deep-sea fishing industry is to be perpetuated through the protection or extermination of these animals. If the official determination by the United States Bureau of Fisheries shows the sea lion is not destructive of food fish, the reefs off the Curry county coast will in all probability be turned into refuges for the protection of the sea lions; while, if the official determination discloses that they are destructive of the salmon and halibut, their extermination will in all probability be hastened.

You can aid in solving this question, and your cooperation is earnestly solicited.
