BANKERS AND MINING

The president of a large national bank in Chicago was under criticism by the presidents of several other banks because of his investments in mines. This man made the following reply to the criticism: "Throughout the West, ages ago, Almighty God built stronger vaults in His granite banks than we have in ours. He filled His vaults with gold, silver and copper. He gave the prospector knowledge and insight, and guided him on his way to the door of the vaults He had built. CHANGES AFFECT SCHOOL ATHLETICS

Proposed Amendments to State Rules Arouse Considerable Discussion in County

High school athletes in Coos county will be affected by new rulings just passed by the Oregon High School Athletic association at its meeting in Portland last week. Different branches of sport will be directly hit if some of these rules are put into force. Chief among the rules to receive much criticism over the state and also in this county is the proposed plan that a player must attend the school the previous semester before being eligible to compete in athletics for the school.

Many of the amendments were directed and proposed by members from districts where it was believed violations of the athletic code were being made. However, it is the consensus of opinion in this section that at least two of the rules will cause the innocent violators the same punishment meted to the guilty. The two will also in many instances prevent many players from receiving a fair chance to compete in college competition.

Attendance Rule

One of the two amendments which is liable to affect players in this section and will always affect some players in every section of the state was read and adopted as follows: "No member of a high school shall be eligible to represent his high unless he has been in attendance the semester immediately preceding." This rule, will effect any boy with an athletic future forced to stop school for a semester, by financial difficulties, from competing in his first semester upon resuming attendance. The final year of play usually adds a polish to the player's fundamentals which is of great assistance in competition for a berth on a college team.

has liberally provided for such development in the natural deep water harbor at Port Orford—the only natural harbor between San Francisco and Puget Sound—and with the beginning of the great rail development of Oregon, a rail line from this harbor to the interior to provide cheap transportation for this great mineralized area, will be a natural consequence, which, when an accomplished fact, will permit of a cheap short haul to tide water where smelters and other reduction works may be erected without fear of damage to vegetation, or the ores may be shipped by water to existing smelters.
