BLOSSOM TIME IN CURRYLAND
(Editorial in Oregon Journal)

Just now along the state highway in the counties of Coos and Curry the azaleas and rhododendrons are blooming riotously.

The highway, you will remember, swings in toward the dark and watchful forests. Here and there it paces sedately among sentinel lines of immensely tall cedars and firs. But ever before it is lost in the numberless hills it turns right about and broadly climbs to a head overlooking the sea.

There the rhododendrons are blooming. There the azaleas are gaiety given form in flowers. All around them are the waves and the sunsets, white cottages seen only now and again, and here the deer leap across the highway in a single bound, reminder that man has won only the border and that within the mountains nature still locks her mysteries. In the masses of the bloom are the tints of the dawn and the ocean.

It is very important information that it is azalea and rhododendron time in southwestern Oregon. Sheer loveliness is encamped between the shore and the forest for all who tour to see.

IT IS YOUR GOVERNMENT—VOTE

The fundamental principle of our form of government is that each citizen shall have the privilege of expressing his opinion in the making of the laws, either directly, as in his initiative and referendum, or indirectly through representatives elected for that purpose. On May 16 a primary election will be held throughout the state of Oregon to nominate candidates for public office to stand for election at the November polls, ranging from national committeeman downward, and including a United States senator, representatives in congress, governor, justices of the supreme court, state senators and representatives, and county officials. It is a privilege granted each citizen—both men and women who have registered—to vote for his or her choice of candidates for the various offices, according to the party under which each citizen is registered. It is more than a privilege—it is a duty from which none should shrink. Citizens are urged to go to the polls next Friday and exercise this great right, giving careful consideration to the various candidates to the end that the best men on the ballot may be nominated. Those who do not vote have no just right to criticize the act of the government under which they live and prosper. Vote early and feel that satisfaction that comes from having fully performed the great duty of citizenship.

REPUBLICAN NATIONAL COMMITTEEMAN

The office of republican national committeeman, while it carries no salary or expense account, is of great importance to the state of Oregon. Ralph E. Williams has honorably served in that capacity for a long period, and has established a wide acquaintance throughout the nation. He is vice chairman of the committee, and wields great powers in the councils of the republican party. He has done much for the general advancement of Oregon and his services should be retained. A vote for Mr. Williams is a vote for the general good of Oregon.
