Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moore of Ophir stopped Sunday for a short visit with Miss Pearl Williams enroute to Langlois.

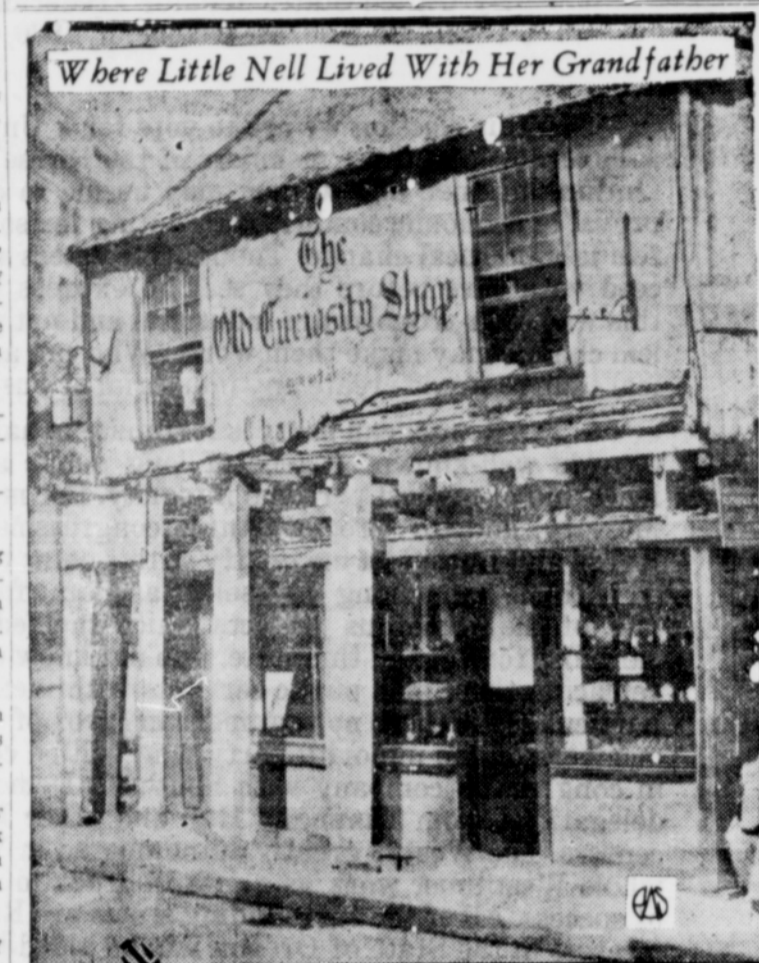
