Floras Lake Lots are Bought at Tax Sale

Six thousand Pacific City lots on Floras Lake in Northern Curry county which were taken over by the county several months ago for delinquent taxes were sold Saturday at a sheriff's sale at the county court house, says the Gold Beach Reporter. Every one of the lots placed on sale were taken at prices ranging from 50 cents to \$1.10 each. The six thousand lots were not only placed

back on the tax roll of the county but the county realized around \$4,000 cash for the sale.

An upset price of 50 cents a lot had been placed on the lots in the townsite by the county court with the understanding that LeRoy Herrod of Los Angeles, representing the Pacific Land Securities, Inc., would bid in the entire lot and place the property on sale in Los Angeles.

Many local people attracted by the bargain price and knowing the potential value of many of the lots, were on hand to take part in the bidding. The choicest lots on the lake front were eagerly sought and bidding was spirited.

Of the total Herrod who offered a flat price of 50 cents each for the lots, bought 4,032. E. Hodge, Arizona capitalist who owns Green Gables at Ophir purchased around 1,000 lots for a price in excess of 50 cents. R. W. Squires of Bandon, C. D. Rice of Pistol River; C. H. Young, cashier of the Curry County bank and other residents of Curry

and Coos counties were successful in bidding for several of the choicest blocks.

Herrod declares that his firm soon will put on an intensive selling campaign in Los Angeles to sell the lots he acquired in the sale. The sale of the Pacific City lots will be conducted along the same lines as the sale of the delinquent tax property which was acquired by the firm in Coos county during the past year. The firm will make use of moving pictures, newspaper advertisements and the radio which will advertise not only the Floras Lake property but also all of Curry county.

Many local people who purchased lots in the tract are planning improvements. They will build cottages and build roads through the tract to make the lots accessible.

Floras Lake is one of the most beautiful fresh water lakes in the county. It is fed by numerous small streams and it has an outlet into the ocean. The lake is fringed with

timber.

MOTHER PROBLEMS

Teaching Orderliness

THERE doesn't seem to be any way to persuade six-year-old sons and daughters to pick up their toys and put them where they belong. If some one stands near and repeatedly prods by saying, "And now pick up the ball, and now pick up the doll's clothes or the ten pins" the prolonged process of being orderly is eventually and painfully accomplished. Little is left of the prodders, however. Funny, isn't it? Children will go around and around Robin Hood's barn to avoid doing something that could be over by the time they begin to think about it. We may nag until nagging seems our chief attribute but it makes no impression. What can be done? Shall we sacrifice our idea of order to save our dispositions? Shall we pick the toys up ourselves to save our energy? If we do, we'll let ourselves in for years of doing just that, and we'll also help the children to form the habit of shirking which they will never be able to overcome. Six years of age is only the beginning of a long, long life of avoiding petty duties and it is the most important age for habit formation. Now the method of attack for this problem is divided into two equally important parts. The first has to do with the elimination of our loquaciousness, our liberality in the use of just plain chatter, our persuasions, our pleadings and our threats which we never bother to carry out. Few words are needed when one wishes to be most convincing and never more true is this than in dealing with children. Have you ever tried the experiment of looking a dangerous animal straight in the eye to keep him from attacking you? Probably not, but try it on your six-year-olds. Look squarely into those teasing young eyes and say, "Son, daughter (whichever the case may be), pick up your toys. Nothing else can be done until they are all back in their places." And mean it! The second part has to do with honesty in our demands. If we're going to insist upon order, we'd better not be too insistent unless our own bureau drawers will bear inspection. We have no right to pose as dictators of a principle which we do not practice and children are quick to observe this form of hypocrisy. If we are convincing and honest, we will have little trouble in obtaining not only order, but any other quality desirable. 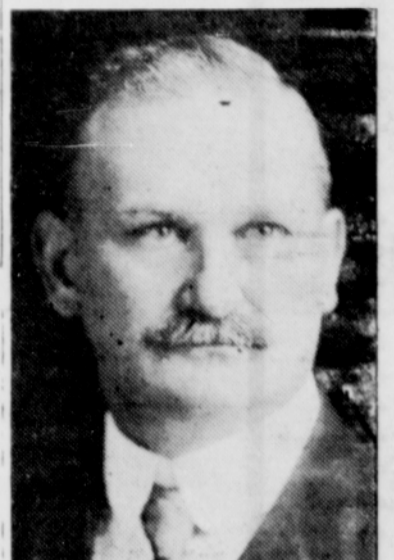

6 Five directors can exercise all these autocratic powers, with all bars against extravagance and oppressive burdens removed.
