THE BLUE SKY LAW

(The Commonwealth Review)

Strengthening of the Oregon blue sky law or substitution for it of a severe statute of fraud is suggested by observers of the plight of investors. Former Governor West points out, in arguing for the new fraud statute, that in the last ten years 3,100 permits for the sale of securities were issued, to a total of \$500,000,000. It is his opinion that the investor is inclined to regard the state permit under the blue sky law as an adequate protection. Others believe that what is needed to protect the unwary investor's money is both lines of action—a strengthening of the law and the passage of a strong fraud statute. Too much hard-earned and badly-needed money has been poured into securities which never had a chance to pay a dividend.

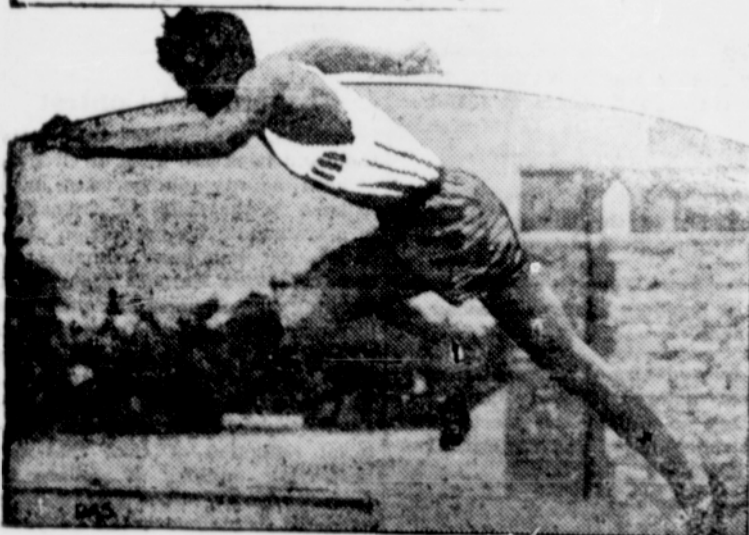
shattered, but no reports of evidence of the quake north of Rogue river have been received.

MY HOME AND YOURS

Black Currant Tea

An old time recipe recommends black currants to alleviate hoarseness, and it is as appetizing as it is helpful it surely is worth trying. As a summer drink served with ice it is also most desirable.

2 dessertspoons of black currant jam
1 pint of water
2 teaspoonfuls of sugar
1/2 lemon
Put jam, water and sugar in a saucepan and bring to the boiling point and allow to simmer for five or six minutes. Strain, add the lemon juice and serve—hot for hoarseness, or cold as a beverage.

It is well to remember that while children should have exercise, it should be diversified. Children taken on a long walk will tire soon, but allowed to play, they will naturally run, jump, walk, skip, use the arms as well as the legs, climb upon elevations, using every muscle. Because this does develop every muscle it is to be encouraged. Games, dancing, each have their place, but no one exercise should be continued for a long time.

Wash lettuce as soon as it comes into the house, place in a tin pail place the cover on and put directly on ice. When one is ready for the salad, the lettuce is clean and crisp, and the "putting together" of the salad a question of seconds.

The habit of opening the kitchen windows frequently to air the kitchen is an excellent one, for fresh air has a bracing effect on the kitchen worker, and at the end of the day she will find that she is less tired than on days when the kitchen has not had the airings. Damp air is better than no air. So don't mind the rain.

Long handles on dust brushes and dust pans save many backaches, and may be purchased very reasonably. There are scrubbing brushes with long handles too. Wall brushes with long handles making it unnecessary to do too much reaching when dusting the walls. A little money expended in real helps is a saving in strength.
