In honor of Fathers Day Reverend Henry chose "the Faith of Our Fathers" as his theme, bringing out that during these days of unrest and stress the real worth while things of life are brought to the acid test. He quoted many examples in the past showing that how in the world of art, literature, music and invention the great achievements were conceived and worked out under the greatest handicaps, and brought home to his listeners the fact that each must bear his burden stoically for out of suffering comes the better things of life.
