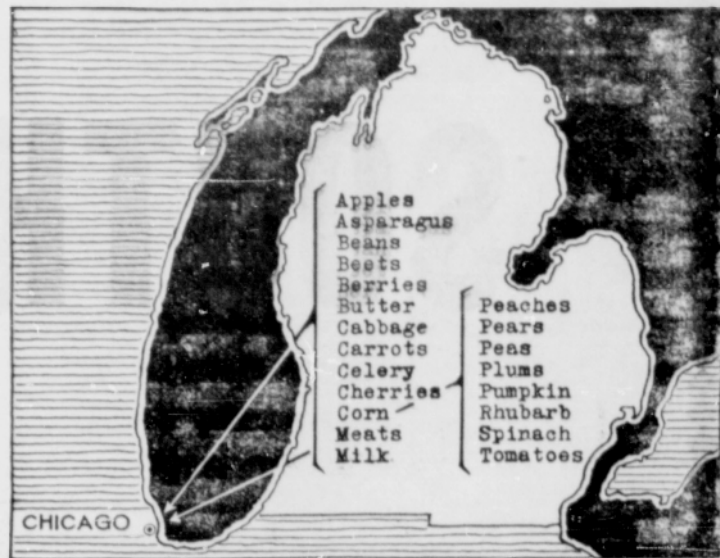

**Orville Hixon Falls From Boom Stick Near Mill While Fishing.**  
 (From Western World)  
 Orville Hixon, 16, son of V. E. Hixon of this city was drowned in the Coquille river about an eighth of a mile above the Moore mill shortly after noon Tuesday when he fell from a boom stick while fishing.  
 Two other young men fishing in the vicinity saw Hixon as he started up the river, walking the boom sticks. He passed them and they warned him of the danger but he continued. When some distance away he apparently fell and caught himself because they saw him astride the boom stick sliding himself along until he reached the boom gate. Here he regained his feet and started walking the next stick. He slipped and fell again, this time into the water. He caught the boom stick when he came up and was apparently hanging on when the other two started toward him to render assistance. However before they got far he let loose and floundered in the water for a few moments, then disappeared. He was not seen again.  
 Captain Theodore Roberge and his coast guard crew went to the scene as soon as word of the accident was received. They dragged the river for several hours but without success. A strong tide was flowing up the river, aided by a heavy south wind, and it is thought the body was carried beneath a raft of logs nearby.  
 The coast guard is keeping a lookout along the river but the body is not expected to float for probably two weeks.  
 Young Hixon recently returned from another part of the state where he had been for several years. He was born and reared in this community and as a child attended the local grade school.

**Favors Sales Tax**

 Coos County's Committee of

Eight met Friday night at Coquille to discuss current administrative matters and to examine legislative measures now before the state legislature. The group went on record as favoring the salary reduction bill, which provides for a graduated reduction in the salaries of state officials from 5 per cent to 45 per cent of the present schedules.  
 The group was practically unanimous in its approval of a sales tax to aid in financing the state government. No definite action was taken on any of the matters discussed as the meeting was called for the purpose of examining current topics, it was stated by members of the group.



## Michigan Food at the Fair

THE "Fair" means, of course, the Century of Progress International Exposition which opens next June at Chicago, and where food products will be shown in the great Agricultural Building which is now rapidly approaching completion on North-erly Island in Lake Michigan.  
 The State of Michigan is deeply interested in showing its food products there because of the fact that its fruits and vegetables form a large contribution to the nation's supply of canned foods. Its cherry industry is especially outstanding, and negotiations are under way for the building of "cherry huts" at the Fair where cherry products alone may be sold.  
**Fruits and Vegetables**  
 The Michigan Canners' Association expects to join with the State of Michigan in this exhibit. It is proposed to show pictures of orchards of cherries and canning factories in miniature models, with the story of their accomplishments conveyed by means of continuous moving illuminated type or in some similar manner.  
 Michigan supplies her canning factories with all small vegetables produced in great quantities exclusively for this purpose, and its celery is said to be the best in quality and the largest in quantity of any State in the Union. Grapes and peaches, too, are produced and preserved in very large quantities.  
 All these foods and many more will be included in Michigan's interesting exhibit in the Agricultural Building. It is significant of the country's faith in the future and the restoration of normal times that Michigan and so many other States are planning such extensive exhibits at Chicago next year.
