Coach Bob Stolz will soon know whether his '61 diamond cutters are capable of cutting the mustard, or merely opening the jar, as the Pacific Pirates open the conference baseball race tomorrow afternoon at Bandon—game time 3:30.

Bob can field a team with a letterman at every position, has an experienced and reliable pitching staff, plus what is known as a reasonably strong bench. This, as the average baseball buff can attest, is a good combination to have going for you as you begin any league play, but is also, or can be, a vague commodity until you have put a few of those tough and rugged league contests under your spikes. Dick Sutherland's Tigers have previously proved themselves ferocious as they caught the purple a couple of weeks ago during the practice schedule and dumped the locals 6-5 in a hotly contested game.

Pacific has had a winning pre-conference slate, winning 3 and lost 2, but past records are usually unreliable and can't be taken as indicative, once the chips are trophy.

they must face the powerful Coquille Red Devils next Tuesday at Pacific, and a pair of wins here could get them off and running.

The Pirates ended the "grapefruit circuit" with an imposing 8-4 win over Brookings last Friday at the southern Curry city, with Paris opening on the hill for the visitors and Zabriski coming on in the fifth inning to preserve the lead and keep the victory intact.

Last Tuesday afternoon, Gold Beach, dumped earlier 9-3 by Pacific, scored a singleton on Zabriski in the second and enjoyed a brief margin. The Pirates roared back and tied the score off Terry Moore, the nifty right hander who recently transferred to GB from Crescent City. The final outcome was in favor of Gold Beach 8-3.

Stolz used most of his squad in the later innings seeking to find the right lineup for his conference opener. He started Daryl Robison behind the plate; Bob Badtlett at first; Ira Chase on second; Paris at short; Ken Rundberg guarding the hot corner; with Eric Johnson, Clarence Byers and Lee Tucker in the outfield. Zabriski, who started for Pacific and hurled the initial four, was charged with the loss.

Stolz will continue to juggle his squad into various positions this week for the opener with tomorrow's mound choice still undecided. Let's see some fans up at Bandon tomorrow—game time is 3:30 and baseball is here and it's a great sport seasonal time of year.

PACIFIC HIGH TRACK TEAM OPENS CONFERENCE SEASON AT BROOKINGS SATURDAY

Pacific high thinclads will get their first taste of competitive action this Saturday afternoon when Coach John Botz takes his 1961 edition of Pirate "tracksters" to Brookings for a dual conference meet with the Brookings Bruins.

Hampered by cold weather, limited turnout, and questionable depth in many of the regularly scheduled events, Botz has none-the-less, been working his stalwarts as steadily as possible and put together a squad that should give a good account of themselves against the Bears. Seniors representing Pacific will include: Eric Johnson in the

high and broad jump; Phil Paris, who will participate in the low hurdles, broad jump, and possibly be used in the javelin; Lee Tucker, 440 and javelin, plus shotput Ray Lowe. The first three are all playing baseball and have had only limited turnout time on the cinder paths and field events. Juniors include: Doug Johnson, last year's second-place finisher in the district 880, who will run his specialty plus the mile; Don Hill, who will also run the four lap grind; Jim Mahaffey, high and low hurdles; plus big Jim Wahl who will specialize in the weight events, javelin, discus and shot. Charlie Hansen, promising sprinter, who has shown very well in practice at the short distances, is a doubtful participant and, if taken to Brookings, will be used and should produce some points for the buccaneers.

Botz must count heavily on his freshmen to come through under pressure and Jerry Cox has performed well in the 100 and high jump; Gary Rogers at 440 and 220 dash lengths, with Gary Marsh a potential point getter over the 220 distance. The 880 relay team is unset at present, but will be built around Doug Johnson, Tucker, Rogers, and either Hansen or Marsh.

Pacific will open their home season at Blanco field on April 22 with a dual meet against Gold Beach and then host the Pacific invitational on the 29th, which will give all the local track and field enthusiasts a chance to see the entire conference in action on the local field. Myrtle Point, Coquille, Bandon, Gold Beach and Brookings will all send teams to this district-wide meet and should be a real show.

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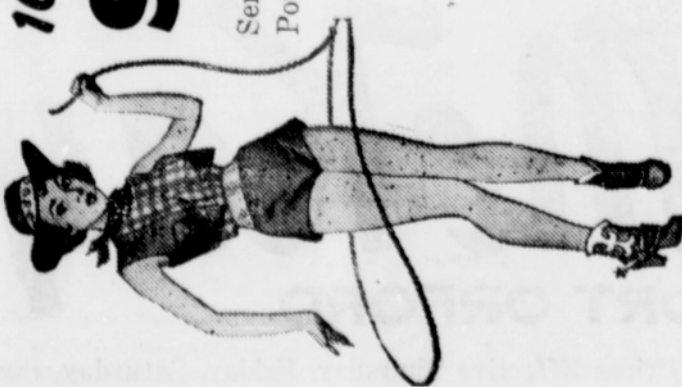
