Southwestern Oregon college opens its doors September 25 and will offer post-high school education opportunities for all citizens. Its main functions are to provide:

1. Educational guidance for the area.
2. A two-year liberal arts instruction.
3. General education instruction.
4. Vocational, business and technical education.
5. Apprentice and occupational extension education.

NEWS FROM THE COMMUNITY CHURCH

Services next Sunday, September 24, will be the last to be held in the old Community church before the transfer to the new church October 1 for the dedication services.

Plans are going forward for a rally day program in the Bible school Sunday, October 1. A goal of 100 per cent attendance has been set for that day.

A Lowrey organ and matching Everett piano are to be installed in the new church this week. Orchestra practice, choir practice, prayer meeting and teachers' meeting were planned to be held in the new church Wednesday evening.

Last Sunday the choir presented a special number, "The Beautiful Garden of Prayer", accompanied by the church pianist, Mrs. Margaret Meyer and music director Ralph Baird. The Rev. Jamie France delivered the message, "Signs of His Coming".

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6. General adult, and cultural education instruction.

The college is headed by Dr. W. L. Van Loan, who was appointed president by the college's board of directors last month. M. M. Romig, who served as acting administrator until Van Loan's appointment will serve as administrative assistant and director of technical-vocational education and the evening division; Charles W. Koburger will serve as director of the general collegiate division; Donald R. Moffitt will be comptroller and chairman of the business division; and Larry J. Whitney will be chairman of the technical division.

Van Loan was formerly a professor of education at OSU immediately before coming to Coos Bay. He also held the position as superintendent of the Corvallis public schools and assistant superintendent of Portland public schools in charge of the Vanport division, as well as superintendent of Benton county schools.

Romig previously was director of the Coos Bay education center under school district 9. He served as director of district 9's evening school since 1949. He has worked as a high school teacher, draftsman, engineer and city manager before coming to Coos Bay. He earned both a BS and Ed.M. at OSU.

General College Division

The first two years of regular college work may be completed at the college. Transfer (lower division) courses parallel freshman and sophomore courses offered by major Oregon universities and four-year colleges and lead to the Oregon State Junior certificate. Students normally transfer to upper division (junior) standing at the end of the sophomore year to whatever school they choose to attend. Students may arrange a general education program in the liberal arts, or they may plan a special course of study to meet particular needs. Curricula now offered include the following: accounting, art, biology, business administration, chemistry, economics, English, foreign languages, geography, history, journalism, literature, mathematics, music, physics, political science, psychology, sociology and speech.

Staff Members

The staff includes: Charles W. Koburger, Jr., director of the collegiate division, instructor in political science, earned his BS in foreign service from Georgetown university, Washington, D.C., in 1943. He was granted a master of arts degree by Niagara university, New York in 1956 in the field of history. From there he came west to study political science at the University of Oregon, where he is working toward a Ph.D. He has had wide experience as a training officer with the armed services, working primarily with military advisory groups in the middle east.

William J. Holmes, a native of Kansas, received his BS degree from Kansas State college of Pittsburg in 1958. The first two years of his college education were taken at Hutchinson junior college, Hutchinson, Kansas. His

MS degree was received from the University of Colorado in 1959 where he taught physical education as a graduate assistant, and was employed by the university athletic department as assistant intramural director. For the past two years he has been teaching and coaching in the public schools of Newton, Kansas.

Robert A. Osborne, who will teach mathematics, is a graduate of Clover Park high school in Lakewood, Washington. He received his bachelor's degree in physics from the University of Washington in 1956, and he expects to obtain the master of science degree in math education in June of 1962 from the University of Oregon.

Margaret Trussell, who will teach geography, U.S. history and survey of the social sciences, comes from Santa Rosa, Calif. She is a graduate of Santa Rosa junior college and of the University of California at Berkeley and received her master's degree in geography from the U of C in 1960. She has taught seven years at the high school and junior college levels in California.

Ronald Lilienthal will teach science. Lilienthal is a native of Coos Bay and a graduate of North Bend high school. He received his bachelor's degree in general science from the University of Oregon in 1958, and his master of science degree in chemistry from Oregon State university which will be granted in June 1962. His experience in teaching consists of two years of graduate assistant teaching at OSU.

Robert C. Croft, college librarian, is a graduate of the University of Oregon with a master's degree in history. His BS degree from the university was in journalism. He has done advanced work at the University of Washington and the U of O in library science. Croft started his professional career in 1950 as an instructor in social science at the U of O while he was completing his master's degree. His next assignment took him to central Oregon where he was principal of Monument high school. He has also been superintendent of Paisley public schools. Croft came to SWOC from a one-year assignment with the air force dependent's school at Ramey Air Force Base, Puerto Rico. In addition to the school librarianship in Puerto Rico, he taught historic courses in Ramey college of Florida State university.

Tom Huhmphyre attended Marshfield high school where he graduated in 1951. He attended the University of Oregon and majored in liberal arts. He received his master's degree in general studies this past summer. His teaching experience includes two years as English instructor at Marshfield high school. As an instructor at SWOC, Huhmphyre will teach English composition, survey of English literature and world literature.

Dr. Lillian S. Van Loan will be in charge of counseling and guidance services for the college. She will also teach psychology. Mrs. Van Loan held the position of assistant professor of psychology at Oregon State university before accepting this position. She has taught at OSU for the past ten years. Mrs. Van Loan's experience includes: director of placement Oregon Education as-

sociation; elementary teacher and principal, secretary teacher, university student teacher supervisor, and director of the Eugene Vocational school. She received a BA degree at OCE, a MS and Ed.D degree at OSU.

Business Division

The business division offers a one year business college program in the stenographic and general office fields. Both day and evening instruction are available. The business division is located at the Coos Bay campus in the east branch building of Marshfield high school.

Technical Division

The technical division is also located at the Coos Bay campus. Only evening instruction is available at present. The curricular offerings are: electronics engineering technology, civil and structural engineering technology and automotive mechanics. These three programs take two years to complete. A one year program is also offered in general drafting.

Licensed practical nursing is planned to begin later on this year. Apprentice related training will be given in the evening school program at the Coos Bay campus as well as occupational extension courses such as welding and electrical codes. General adult classes are given there also in Bishop sewing, upholstery, foreign languages, etc. Certain graduate and lower division collegiate courses will be offered at the Coos Bay campus in the evening also.

Technical Staff

The technical-vocational division teaching staff includes: Donald R. Moffitt, chairman of business education, has been employed in business administration and accounting fields before coming to Oregon from Michigan in 1960. He holds a BS from Ferris institute. Moffitt was coordinator of business education for the Coos Bay education center before accepting this position.

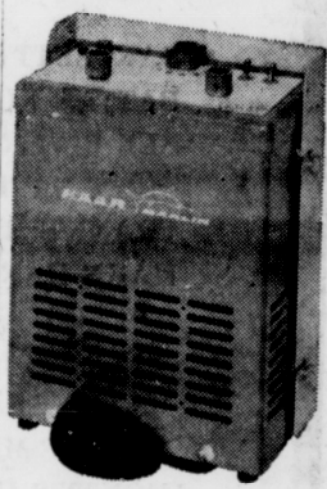
Larry J. Whitney, chairman of the technical division, was coordinator of vocational and technical education for the past three years with Coos Bay education center. He has also been employed as a diesel mechanic, millwright, machine erector and instructor in the U.S. Army Engineer school. He earned a BS degree and has done graduate work at OSU.

Wayne Andrews, automotive instructor, was employed as an instructor of automotive mechanics at Marshfield high school for the past school year. Before coming to Coos Bay, Andrews worked as an automotive mechanic and service manager. He has been connected with the automotive industry for the past twenty years. Andrews has attended General Motors institute at Tigar, and sessions at OSU.

Roger Spough, instructor of electronics, has been actively employed in the electronics industry since 1938. Spough attended the naval research laboratory material school in 1943. He was chief engineer for KOOS radio station for nine years. Spough taught electronics for the CBCF for the past three years.

The other members of the technical-vocational and general adult teaching staff are: Anthony Arrambide, foreign languages; James Becker, electrician apprentice; Maurine Bayes, business education; Clara Eickworth, sewing; Helen Ferguson, business education; Ellsworth Leegard, welding; Robert Merrill, related technical subjects; Don Morse, automotive mechanics; Lyle Shibley, driver training; Venita Stender, sewing; Dick Stoll, automotive mechanics; Elizabeth Van Ryckevassel, languages; Theodore Willard, business education; Robert Wilson, engineering; William Gamble, carpenter apprentice; Robert Gross, plumbing apprentice and Mr. Curtis, business education.

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
