Six and a half tables of players competed last Saturday night at Ophir school and played the Mitchell movement which permits six couples to share in the winning.

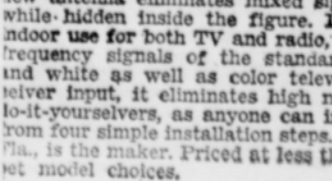

Consumers Increase

SALEM—Residential and rural users of electric energy supplied by private utility companies in Oregon consumed 278,900,000 kilowatt hours during September, according to monthly statistics released by the public utility commission.

This was a 2.4 percent increase over the same period in 1960.

These statistics are part of a total of 4,714,160,000 kilowatt hours of energy during the last twelve months, a 1.5 percent increase over the same period in 1960.

Research Grants Awarded in Oregon

Figures supplied to Senator Wayne Morse by the U. S. Public Health Service showed research grants awarded in Oregon for the month of September totalled \$496,032.

Of this amount, \$121,338 was awarded to the Medical Research Foundation of Oregon, Inc., in Portland; \$62,058 to Oregon State University; \$29,067 to the University of Oregon Dental School in Portland; \$72,825 to the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland; \$10,961 to the Portland State college; and \$32,024 to Reed college.

The research awards were made by the National Institutes of Health and the Bureau of State Services within the Public Health Service.

Actuarial Firm Chosen by SIAC

SALEM—Woodward & Fondiller, Inc. of New York and Los Angeles, was the actuarial firm selected from a group of four submitting bids, to make a study for the state industrial accident commission, it was announced this week by Sidney B. Lewis, chairman of the commission.

"Those who have tried to imply that our rates are the subject of an inquiry by some state body are misrepresenting the facts," Lewis told the press. "While no actuarial study of this type can be conducted without rates entering the picture, it is the rate structure, the actuarial soundness of present rate-making procedures under the present law, that will be determined by such a survey. The rates themselves are not the focal point of some imagined inquiry. The study is being made at our request by a private actuarial firm and no state panel."
