Fish Commission Hatcheries Report High Salmon Returns

"Proof of the pudding in relation to the Oregon Fish commission's revised salmon-rearing

program seems to be in the offing this year," Ernest R. Jeffries, the commission's director of fish culture, said in commenting on the large number of silver salmon that have returned to fish commission hatcheries thus far this season.

Bandon Beats Pacific 52-20

With Gill Willis leading the way with two touchdowns, seven Bandon players scored, defeating the Pacific team 52 to 20 Friday night and stepping into second place in the final Sunset conference standings. The Tigers racked up all but six of its points in the first half—19 in the first quarter and 27 in the second.

Kit 'n Kaboodle

Following is a summary of federal statutes which have made grants for education—we can see by the dates on some of these that "Federal Aid to Education" is actually older than the constitution in some cases:

1785—Land grants reserving lot No. 16 in each township for the maintenance of schools.

1787—The Northwest Ordinance, "... schools and the means of education shall forever be encouraged."

1802—The Ohio enabling act. Grants section 16 of every township in states carved from the public domain to the township inhabitants for support of schools—all states admitted after 1848 except Texas, Maine and West Virginia were affected.

1803—Granted a whole township to Ohio for the purpose of establishing a seminary of learning.

1862—Morrill land grant act. Gave to each state an amount of 30,000 acres of land (or the equivalent in script) per congressman for support of colleges to teach the agricultural and mechanical arts.

1890—Second Morrill act. Increased support for colleges.

1908—Nelson amendment to the Morrill acts. Again increased support for land-grant colleges—the permanent allocation annually under these acts is \$2,550,000.

1917—Smith-Hughes act. Provides grants for instruction in vocational subjects by public schools.

1929—George-Reed act. Increased appropriations for Smith-Hughes—NOW \$7,138,000 annually.

1935—Bankhead-Jones act. Increased again for land-grant colleges and universities.

1936—George-Deen act. Extended aid to vocational instruction by adding distributive occupations.

1941—Lanham act. Provided

from 6 to 7 inches in length.

Both fall and spring chinook salmon reared under the new feeding schedule are due back from the ocean next year. "We have reason to be optimistic over the possibility of increased runs of chinooks, based on the excellent returns of silvers under the new hatchery program," Jeffries stated.

At Fall Creek, site of the fish commission's Alsea salmon hatchery, for example, 1,600,000 eggs are on hand, with another 500,000 expected to be taken soon from ripening adults now in the hatchery's holding pond.

This is the largest egg take at the Alsea hatchery since it began in 1952. Thus far, 1,200 adult females and 1,100 adult males have been taken at the Fall Creek installation in addition to 3,000 silver jacks. Returns at other stations handling silver salmon are comparable.

The 1958 brood, represented in the current hatchery returns of adult silvers from the ocean, was the first reared under the new feeding program initiated at fish commission hatcheries three years ago. Young salmon are started on a "wet" diet composed essentially of finely ground meat and fish products. Research has shown that raw salmon viscera, one of the components of the wet diet, is responsible for transmission of various diseases to the young fish. Under the new program this portion of the diet is now pasteurized, thus eliminating one of the primary causes of hatchery fish mortality. The development of the nutritionally complete Oregon moist pellet, through the cooperative efforts of the fish commission and Oregon State university specialists, has also made a major contribution to the success of the hatchery production program. Silver salmon are fed these pellets from the time they reach 2 1/2 to 3 inches in length until they are ready for release as yearlings, at which time they usually average

1944—Serviceman's Readjustment act. The GI bill.

1946—National school lunch act.

1946—George-Barden act. Supplements the George-Deen and Smith-Hughes acts by authorizing up to \$29,000,000 for study of practical nursing and fisheries—NOW \$33,800,000.

1950—Additional assistance for construction in federally affected areas.

1952—Veteran's Readjustment act—Korean GI bill.

1954—School milk program.

1956—Public Laws 911 and 1027, amended the George-Barden act to include instruction at college level—added \$375,000.

1956—War orphans Educational Assistance acts.

1956—Five-year program of federal grants to extend library services to rural areas federally affected.

1958—National Defense Education act—\$887,000,000 over four-year period to strengthen instruction in math, science, languages, guidance, etc.

1958—Added to appropriations for construction aid to federally impacted areas.

1958—Federal grants to train teachers for mentally retarded.

1958—Federal grants for purchase of films to teach the deaf.

1960—Federal library act extended for five years.

In fiscal 1961 (year ending June 30, 1961) the total federal appropriations for education amounted to \$893,076,143.

LOANS MADE TO OREGON BUSINESSMEN

Senator Wayne Morse said last week that the report on September loans by the Small Business Administration showed 13 such loans to Oregon businesses.

They went to firms located in Ashland, Blue River, Coos Bay, Eugene, Hood River, Medford, Portland and Salem. The largest enterprise employs 225 people, and the smallest employs one.
