Retired Local Banker Publishes New Edition Dairy Ranch Rhymes

W. J. Sweet, retired president of the Bank of Bandon (now Western Bank) after 50 years of service, has just published his second book "Dairy Ranch Rhymes and Sweet Family Yarns". The first book was published in 1942, and, although it was intended mainly for distribution among members of the immediate family and close personal friends, it interested many acquaintances and the supply was soon exhausted.

The second book, which comes 19 years later, includes not only the rhymes which in honey "blue-nosed" dialect cover practically every phase of dairy life and are replete with subtle humor and good advice, but an illustration of the dairy accomplishments within the Sweet family by way of photos and records of some of the world famous purebred cows bred by Sweet Jerseys on the family ranch at Elk river in northern Curry

son.

Also in the new book are 15 Christmas poems written by the author and which were used on Christmas cards sent to friends during past years, many of which have been kept and cherished by the recipients. They are of a deeply spiritual nature.

Another additional feature is a full-page reproduction in color of a painting "Groves On the Hart Place" by Elaine Mayes of San Francisco, artist granddaughter of the author. It illustrates one of the poems.

After allotting the supply of the second publication to members of the family, and to the schools and libraries of the area, Mr. Sweet finds that he has a surplus which he is offering to the local public at a less-than-cost price of \$3.95 each, while the supply lasts.

With each book will be given a copy of the essay "Fulfilling Our Promised Final Peace", written and copyrighted by William John Sweet in 1958 and which has been widely circulated and favorably commented upon. It was so well received by the late U.S. Senator Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon that he had it printed, by unanimous consent of the Senate, in the Congressional Record.

The essay, printed and bound in booklet form, is a basic analysis of present world ideologic and economic conditions. It is founded upon the principles espoused by the Constitution of the United States and upon the Holy Bible.

Labor Should Agree To State Pen Work

Wiley Clowers, Oregon Farm Bureau president, said today prior to leaving for the American Farm Bureau convention in Chicago that organized labor should not object to using penitentiary labor for building a new women's prison wing. Clowers said agriculture has not objected to employing inmates on the state-owned farms where much of the food used in state institutions is grown.

Milk, eggs, poultry and beef are produced in sufficient quantities to supply the state institutions in Salem, Clowers said, and the combined production of these enterprises could add substantially to the income of farmers in the immediate area of Salem. However, he pointed out, if the institutions were to purchase their food products on the open market, the tax cost of institutions would increase accordingly.

Clowers said the greatest value in using convict labor in constructive pursuits lies in the area of rehabilitation. These people must be kept busy on jobs which have a purpose, said the Farm Bureau president, if they are going to return to society with anything approaching good work habits.

"We think labor leaders should take a new look at the prison building program and consider allowing inmates to work within the prison walls as a contribution to the rehabilitation program of the penitentiary as well as a saving to taxpayers."

Drug Use Urged In Cancer Care

Washington D. C. — Dr. Sidney Farber, a leading cancer specialist, has urged more widespread use of drugs in the treatment of cancer patients.

While final control of cancer is still in the future, he said, achievements of great importance have been made in the treatment of the disease by chemicals.

Farber is professor of pathology of Harvard Medical School and director of research at the Children's Cancer Research Foundation, Boston. He spoke at a conference of 1,000 cancer specialists sponsored by the Cancer Chemotherapy National Service Center.

"Although more than 260,000 patients will die of cancer this year," he said, "it is doubtful whether more than 10,000 of these will be systematically treated and studied by doctors skilled in cancer chemotherapy."

"For the most part, chemotherapy is not administered to the patient with cancer until he is in a state of advanced cancer or actually moribund (dying)."

Most doctors rely on more conventional treatment, such as surgery or radiation, especially in the early stages.

Farber said that "chemotherapy should be used early when metastases (spreading of the disease) are found, and not reserved until the patient is moribund."

The meeting at which Farber spoke is a two-day conference called to review progress in the field of cancer chemotherapy. The agency sponsoring it is a branch of

Unemployment Placement Up

SALEM (Special) — Right in line with higher employment and lower unemployment figures this year compared to last recently released by the Oregon Department of Employment, the Oregon State Employment Service reported that it was able to place 748 more persons in non-agricultural jobs in November, 1961 than in November last year.

Eldon Cone, director of the

Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Dr. Isidor S. Ravdin, past president of the American College of Surgeons, said Thursday that it is now certain cancer will come under control just as diabetes has.

And he also said in a speech to the conference that it is highly likely that "before another year is passed, we may well find that certain of the common human malignant lesions" may be caused by viruses.

"We may have information on the control of such lesions by chemical agents," he said.

That was one of the more hopeful notes sounded at the two-day conference. The main theme was "cautious optimism" and the public was told that no breakthrough is in sight in the fight against the disease.

Unemployment Placement—24



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OSSES, in reporting the increased number of placements last month, agreed the improved overall economy this year, plus a more intensified placement program by the employment service throughout the state were the chief factors in being able to find more jobs for people this year. A longer period of good weather which allowed more outdoor work, including logging and construction this fall, was thought to be another contributing factor.

At only four of the state's 26 local employment service offices were there fewer job placements made this November compared to last, Cone said, and these were all in areas where agriculture is the prominent industry.

In the larger cities, the number of placements in November, 1961 compared to last November looked like this: Albany, 197 over 165; Astoria, 83 over 51; Eugene, 430 over 403; Klamath Falls, 188 over 95; Medford, 134 over 98; Pendleton, 150 over 126; Portland, 1,492 over 1,144; Roseburg, 88 over 24; Salem 700 over 683. At Bend placements went up over 33 per cent higher than a year ago.

At the same time, Cone announced that since July 1 of this year, when the 1962 fiscal year began, more non-agricultural placements have been made in all but ten local employment service offices than were made during all of fiscal year 1961, ending June 30.

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APPLE PECAN ROLLS make a Good Breakfast Better



Their plumes of cinnamon and apple drifting through the house make these rolls warm persuaders for generous breakfasts.

They whip up appetites. Before you know it, the members of the family are eating—and enjoying—the sound breakfast essential to build quick energy for the morning's work.

These Apple Pecan Rolls are light and hot and love to drink up butter. Spicy with cinnamon, with a taffy-like topping, each bite is crunchy with nuts and tastes of apples. With good reason! The rolls unfold a thick filling of canned apple sauce and pecans blended with butter and brown sugar. And they stay so fresh and moist they can be made the afternoon before and just reheated in the morning.

- 1 package roll mix
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups canned apple sauce
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- Cinnamon

Prepare roll mix according to directions on package, adding 2 tablespoons of sugar. Cover; let rise until double in bulk.

Add 2 tablespoons butter to apple sauce; cook 10 minutes to evaporate some of the liquid, stirring occasionally; cool. Melt remaining 4 tablespoons butter in 9"x9"x2" pan; add brown sugar and heat until melted.

Roll out dough to 17"x9"x1/2" rectangle; spread with cooled apple sauce, sprinkle with pecans and cinnamon; roll up jelly roll fashion. Slice in 1" slices. Arrange cut side up in pan on sugar mixture. Cover; let rise until double in bulk. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, 20-25 minutes. Serve warm. Makes 16 rolls.

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
