HOME FOR CHRISTMAS

Going home for Christmas? To be sure you get there, drive a safe car and drive it safely. So advises Vern L. Hill, director of the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles.

"Whether you are a college student bound for home and holidays or you are taking your family to visit relatives, make certain the vehicle you drive is in A-1 shape for winter weather and road hazards," Hill recommended.

Brakes, lights, windshield wipers, heater-defroster system are among items that should be inspected before the trip begins, the official said.

He also warned against driving in a completely closed car and suggested that at least a vent or rear window be partially open to allow fresh air into the car and help prevent drowsiness.

The car should be prepared for bad weather, such as snow, by always carrying reinforced tire chains for use when needed.

Falling to prepare for bad road conditions, "trips up" many a holiday, he said. At best it means a delay and at worst it can result in injury or death.

Mills Named SIAC Training Officer

SALEM—James H. Mills, Jr., retired naval officer, has accepted the post of director of training for the State Industrial Accident Commission, Sidney B. Lewis, chairman of the commission announced this week.

"The position has been created to help develop personnel that will have skills and up-to-date attitudes needed in the conduct of modern-day business, especially for the personal contacts with claimants, employers, hospital personnel and physicians," Mr. Lewis explained. "This is part of SIAC's major effort to convert impersonal paper work to a better personal approach to those of the public the agency serves."

Captain Mills at the time of his retirement, was commanding officer, U. S. Naval Air Station at Alameda, California, one of the navy's major air stations and fleet air bases over which he had responsible supervision especially in industrial relations and mobilization readiness. Of the 30 years he served with the navy, 23 were spent in naval aviation.

FREIGHT CLASSIFICATION GIVEN BY COMMISSIONER

SALEM, December 19—Motor carriers in Oregon were given authority to use a new uniform freight classification Monday by the State Public Utility Commissioner, to become effective December 31, 1961.

The full set of ratings will not, for the present, carry their own rates in tariffs but will be converted into the long standing 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th class ratings.

Forrest B. Cooper Is New Engineer

Forrest B. Cooper, deputy state highway engineer since 1956, was appointed state highway engineer by the highway commission at the regular meeting in Salem. He succeeds W. C. Williams who died November 30 following a period of illness.

In Oregon the state highway engineer is both the administrative head of the department and chief engineer. The highway department has 3,700 employees and is responsible for all aspects of the 7,600-mile Oregon highway system.

Cooper, who is 58, started with the highway department in 1922. He held the positions of transitman and resident engineer, and in 1937 was promoted to district maintenance superintendent with headquarters in Redmond. He was promoted in 1947 to assistant division engineer at Roseburg. He has since served as county and city relations engineer in Salem, right of way engineer, assistant construction engineer, and became construction engineer in September, 1955. Cooper is a registered professional engineer and past president of the Northwest Society of Highway Engineers. He is secretary-treasurer of the Western Association of State

Highway Officials, a member of three committees for the American Association of State Highway Officials, and a member of the highway research board committee on construction practices—rigid pavement.
