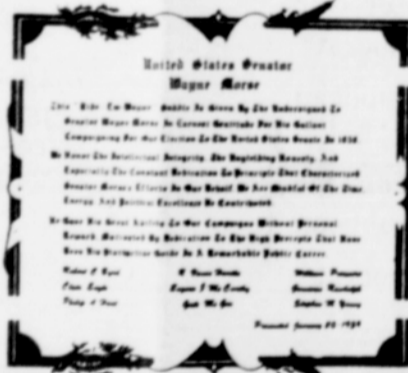
E. D. Spencer, Oregon State Democratic Chairman:
