Tax Reminder

Candidates in 1964: Goldwater's Remarks, Johnson 'Dead', Rockefeller Moves On

Washington, D. C. — The recent political remarks of Senator Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) have started the political pot boiling eighteen months before party conventions are called to order.

Senator Goldwater, one of the Republicans who might be named to head his party ticket in 1964, told a group of newsmen recently he was not interested in running for Vice President two years hence.

And he said that President John Kennedy had demonstrated some neat political magic in having vice President Lyndon Johnson star in a disappearing act. Goldwater says he doesn't want to become a "big fat zero," alluding to Johnson's present status.

It is true that the present Vice President has been heard from very little in the past two years. President Kennedy has been the whole show. But, there are conflicting reports as to whether Johnson is a forgotten man. There are some who say he has carefully been building political fences for 1968.

Goldwater, at least, thinks he is dead. And Goldwater says he is not interested in running for Vice President and death. Yet if Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York were nominated, Goldwater would be a logical second-place man from several viewpoints. He is a Westerner. He is of the conservative wing of the party. He is well known and would poll a heavy vote in the South, where the G. O. P. convention might think the Rockefeller-Goldwater ticket a good one. Evidently the Arizona Senator realizes there is some thinking along this line, and his latest remarks are designed to nip such calculations in the bud.

Goldwater may have a chance to be the party's number-one man, though he faces a hard

fight, as a genuine conservative, to get the top nomination. He wants to wage that fight until victory or defeat. If he misses, the second spot could look more attractive. It always does to defeated presidential nomination candidates at party conventions.

Meanwhile, Governor Nelson Rockefeller's forces are confident the New York Governor is fast wrapping up the 1964 G. O. P. presidential nomination with the defeat of Richard Nixon in California, they say Rockefeller has no major competitor.

They feel the convention would never turn to Goldwater, because of the wide conviction of many political science students that a genuine conservative could not win a national election.

Yet the most recent Gallup poll showed that there were more conservatives in the country right now than liberals. The margin was close, 51 to 49 percent, when the "don't know" category was included. This would apparently indicate that the country is still in a conservative mood.

Despite the election of President Kennedy in 1960, the congressional vote that year (and the Nixon vote) showed the country wasn't in an all-out New Frontier mood. In fact, many believe the country is in a conservative cycle, that is continuing to gather strength and that President Kennedy with his personality and political assets, has managed so far to successfully buck the tide.

They feel a real conservative might poll a tremendous vote. But the delegates to the G. O. P. convention will have to be convinced. They haven't nominated a real conservative since 1936, and the memory of that year still haunts Republicans.

Crime Council Asks Legislature's Change of Child, Family Courts

The Oregon Council on Crime and Delinquency today released its report calling for the legislature to take steps to revamp Oregon's court services dealing with problems of children and families.

Based upon its conviction that the key unit of our society is the family, the council questions the wisdom of dispersing family related cases among as many as five courts with limited jurisdiction and limited communication and coordination between them, and operating without a common approach to family problems.

William J. Moshofsky, council chairman, made it clear the council does not question that a variety of special courts may be needed to deal with the civil and criminal problems created by people living together in a complex society.

Moshofsky summarized the council's findings as:

1. The judicial handling of family related problems which are the source of much delinquency and crime is dispersed among five separate and independent courts on a hodge-podge, overlapping basis, thus preventing a unified approach solving such problems and protecting society.

2. The lack of skilled staff and other diagnostic services prevent most of these courts from identifying and dealing effectively with the basic problems causing court intervention. Moshofsky concludes that the Oregon Council on Crime and Delinquency found that there is an urgent need for a comprehensive study of the structure, organization, staffing and function of Oregon's courts concerned with family related problems.

The council found many problems and looked at possible solutions such as the family court system adopted recently in Rhode Island and New York.

However, because of the seriousness and complexity of the whole problem from the standpoint of financing, personnel, law and geographic needs, the council could not recommend specific solutions to the many problems it identified.

Comprehensive Study

"The council therefore recommends that the Oregon legislature provide for a comprehensive study of the handling of family related matters in Oregon courts," Moshofsky reported, adding:

"This study should be conducted for the legislature by an objective, technically qualified organization, preferably from outside the state.

"The report of the study should provide answers to the following questions:

"1. What feasible court structure and organization can be developed which will make possible a unified approach to the problems of families and children coming before them?"

"2. What diagnostic and treatment tools should such courts have to insure that appropriate and effective action is taken in each case?"

The report concludes that "The Oregon Council on Crime and Delinquency stands ready to support and assist efforts to achieve action on this recommendation."

Mrs. Crooks, chairman of the council sub-committee on courts, stressed that failure to deal effectively with these family problems is very costly in dollars and lives. The OCCD is a part of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency and a member of

the Oregon United Appeal.

Funds Available To Clear Debris From Streams

The United States Department of Agriculture has made some funds available to pay part of the cost of cleaning debris from land and in streams caused by the wind storm of October 12.

The expenditure of these funds for cleaning up purposes will be administered by the County A.S.C. Committee. It is important, according to Hollis Mast, chairman, that all persons who have suffered this kind of storm damage and who are interested in cost sharing benefits from these Government Funds, make application at the County A.S.C. office in the Courthouse at Coquille as soon as possible.

To be eligible to receive cost sharing benefits on any clean up work done since the storm, which occurred on October 12, it is necessary that the application be filed before January 25, he said.

Emergency funds are expected to be available throughout 1963 to pay cost shares on clean up work not yet completed, but in these cases the application must be filed before the work is started.

Commenting on this debris removal program, County Agent George Jenkins emphasizes the importance of this clean up program, especially on farm woodland to eliminate fire hazard and to reduce damage from insect pest and diseases. The removal of debris from streams and waterways is important to protect fish life and to prevent stream bank erosion, he said.

The Red Cross Blood Mobile will be at Ocean Crest gymnasium, January 22, 1963, from 3 p.m. until 7 p.m. Doctor E. F. Lucas will be physician in charge during operation of the unit.

There is an urgent need for all types of blood. The Blood Bank is short 1,000 pints of its estimated requirement and specialty surgery has been curtailed in some hospitals until an adequate supply is available. Bandon's quota for this drive will be 75 pints. George Barnes, publicity director for the drive, says "Let's oversubscribe our quota."

Tax Account No. Use Important

A. G. Erickson, district director of internal revenue for Oregon, has issued the following statement regarding tax account numbers:

Public Law No. 87-397, approved Oct. 5, 1961, requires that banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions, and other payers of interest and count numbers of their shareholders obtain the tax account numbers of their shareholders or depositors and submit to the Internal Revenue Service.

For those individuals having Social Security numbers the Social Security number is prescribed as the account number to be included on the tax and information returns filed with the Service.

If a person does not have a Social Security number, a number will be assigned upon receipt of an application.

These applications may be obtained from the taxpayer's nearest Internal Revenue or Social Security office or by mail by addressing a request to the District Director of Internal Revenue, 830 N. E. Holladay, Portland 12, Ore.

The Internal Revenue Service, in addition to more than 90 million tax returns filed each year, receives approximately 340 million separate statements, payments, and information returns.

The task of associating these documents to name and address is tremendous and often leads to many potential errors requiring contact with the taxpayers.

The use of an identification number for tax administration purposes will be beneficial to the taxpayer as well as the Internal Revenue Service. It will help assure all taxpayers that their withheld taxes, deposits, and payments are credited to their proper accounts.

Cranberry Film Wins Top Award

"Heritage of Flavor," a 25-minute movie telling the colorful story of the native cranberry in color and sound, has received first prize in the film class at the 17th annual Co-operative Information Service Fair, sponsored by the National Council of Farmers Cooperatives.

"Heritage of Flavor," produced a year ago by Ocean Spray Cranberries, Inc. and currently available to schools, clubs, organizations and TV stations, piled up a combined audience of about four million people during 1962.

Competing with 950 individual entries in 42 classes, Ocean Spray also received first place in the advertisement class for a full color magazine advertisement "Chicken Every Sunday . . . Cranberries Every Chicken." Two third places were received for current advertisement "Next Time It's Frozen Dinner . . . Give It Flair With Cranberries" and for an advertising booklet prepared for Ocean Spray sales representatives and brokers.

A national cooperative of some 1300 cranberry growers, Ocean Spray is headquartered in Hanson, Mass. and has installations at Onset, North Harwich and Chatham, Mass., Bordenstown and Whitesville, N. J., Wisconsin Rapids, Wisc., North Chicago, Ill., Markham, Wash., Bandon, Ore. and St. Johns, P. Q., Canada.

Fines, Penalties Bring \$912,186

State Treasurer Howard C. Belton said today that remittances to the state from traffic fines and other penalties for the year 1962 amounted to \$912,186.99, as compared to \$879,665.74 for the calendar year 1961.

Of the total remitted, \$665,196.01 was credited to the general fund, \$206,612.76 to the state highway fund, \$38,703.72 state game fund, \$2,336.50 commercial fisheries, \$33.00 marine board, \$100.00 board of pharmacy, \$200.00 medical examiners, and \$15.00 board of health. Distribution of the funds is directed by state law.

IT'S YOUR LAW

Respect For Law Makes Democracy Live

TELL ALL
Tell your lawyer as much as you can think of about your legal problem. He is sworn to keep it a secret. The law and his profession also call upon him to keep the secret unless you give him permission to tell, or you yourself break the confidence by telling others. A secret has two ends. Yours and your lawyer's.

Why does the law thus protect your secrets? For justice to prevail, you need counsel: You have to be free to tell him things without fear of revelation, or he cannot give you advice on your troubles, or protect your interests in court. You could not get a fair trial unless he knows the facts, to know how to guard your interests. This is why your lawyer may question you closely. One seemingly trivial fact may make the difference.

Thus, suppose you think the paint job on your house cost too much, you refused to pay, and the contractor sues. But suppose also before he sued, you had asked him not to cut the price, but for more time to

pay. By this request, you may have "acknowledged" the debt, and you may have to pay the bill in full. Your lawyer must know such things to advise you.

Another case: Suppose you stumbled and fell over a crack in a sidewalk. You sue. But suppose you have walked that way time and again and knew about the crack. Then you know of the hazard and yet do not avoid it. You help bring on your injuries. Such "contributory negligence" could change the nature of your whole case. When your lawyer asks you about such things, tell him all.

One exception: a lawyer is duty bound to prevent a crime and to protect the prospective victims, even though he hears about the plan to do it from a client or would-be client.

Port Orford Man Serves in Caribbean

Camp Pendleton, Calif. (FHT-NC) — Marine Staff Sergeant Roger D. Montgomery, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Montgomery of Highway 101 N., Port Orford, has returned to Camp Pendleton, Calif., after serving with the Fifth Marine Expeditionary Brigade of the United States Marine Corps in the Caribbean.

The unit arrived in California on Dec. 16, two months after embarking in 20 amphibious ships and passing through the Panama Canal. The combined Navy and Marine Corps force leaving the Pacific Coast was 18,000.

The force spent 51 days at sea and visited ports in Puerto Rico, Jamaica and Panama.

Interest Checks Brighten Year

Interest payments totaling \$201,911 were distributed during December to members of the Oregon Egg Producers reports Al Boennighausen, general manager of the farmer-owned marketing and purchasing cooperative.

The year-end cash disbursement represents the annual 6% interest payment due for 1962 on the Co-op's outstanding series of Capital Certificates. The December disbursement marks the 28th consecutive annual interest payment to Certificate holders.

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
