## FARM BUREAU FURROW Minimum Wage Bill Would Deal Changes to Farm Operations

A Minimum Wage and Hour bill is again before the Senate in Salem aimed at bringing all labor in the state under the \$1.25 minimum wage and placing them on a 40-hour week.

The bill would include agricultural workers and, if passed, would play havoc with agricultural practices in the state.

The proposed legislation would also affect piece-work rates by providing time-and-a-half pay for over 40 hours of work.

There are also provisions for regulation of workers under the age of 18.

Tagged Senate Bill 64, the bill sets some pretty hard and fast rules for agriculture and
