Senate Minority Leader Defends Budgets For Education, Civil Defense, Elderly

Earlier this session, we interviewed several of the legislature's leading figures: Senate President Ben Maza, House Speaker Clarence Burton, and House Minority Leader F. F. "Monty" Montgomery.

This week we talked with Senate Minority Party Leader Anthony Yturri.

The veteran legislator from Ontario's collapsed earlier this month in the capital building from overwork and exhaustion. He returned to his duties after spending two days in a Salem hospital, but he's reduced his work load while he regains his strength.

"I had been going full-out, and simply ran out of gas," he explained.

Sen. Yturri expressed his thoughts on budget-cutting. He supports such cuts in most areas, but strongly opposed "drastic or unreasonable" slashes in areas of education, civil defense or consideration for Oregon's aged.

He agrees with most other legislators that "without doubt, taxation and expenditures" are the most serious problems confronting the 1963 Legislature.

Sen. Yturri blames much of the current "dilemma" on previous legislatures.

Surpluses Have Been Spent

"In past sessions, we've had budget surpluses ranging up to \$15 million," he said. "And the Democrat-controlled legislatures in recent years chose to spend them."

He pointed out that, in 1957 the state's budget was \$220 million, "which was submitted by the outgoing Republican governor. Now, six short years later, our budget has climbed to over \$400 million."

The 46-year old Republican explained that Oregon's economy "has not proportionately kept abreast of state expenditures. When we had surpluses, instead of reducing rates, we kept on spending."

"Now we have no surplus," he said. "We cannot use any monies paid by past taxpayers. We've reached the point where if we wish to maintain the present level of state services, a \$400 million budget is not out of line."

Per Capita Costs High

He compared per capita costs for state service between Oregon (\$225 per year) and Idaho (\$150 per year).

"We've come to the critical moment of decision," Yturri warned. "Shall we maintain our state services and increase taxes? Or shall we reduce the level of services and retain our present tax structure?"

He explained that Governor Hatfield and the State Department of Finance, since last April, worked on the budget submitted to the legislature in December. Original requests from the various state agencies totaled \$465 million.

"The governor and the department of finance scrutinized these requests—in the same way that the Ways and Means Committees are now doing," he emphasized. "Much to the dismay of all agencies, including education, \$90 million was trimmed from those requests, leaving a \$405 million budget which would maintain—but not improve—state services."

"Now the Ways and Means Committee says it will cut \$20 million more from the \$405 million budget," Yturri added. "If they can do it, more power to them. It would be wonderful. But I believe they can only achieve this by taking the bulk of that \$20 million from education," he warned.

Against Further Education Cuts

"The governor feels he has already made every possible cut from education's budget, if we are to provide our younger

people with the same educational opportunities available to our children today," Yturri said.

"Governor Hatfield has not, and will not, object to many of the budget curtailments made by Ways and Means," Yturri explained. "This is indicated by the fact that he has already signed many budget-cutting bills this session."

"But the governor will object to further reduction of education's budget."

"Likewise, he protests the emasculate or abolishment of the State Civil Defense Department," Yturri emphasized.

"The governor believes Oregon should follow the national philosophy on civil defense, and he will fight for it. Simply to say that civil defense did not function satisfactorily on one occasion is not an indictment of the principle of the system," he said.

Civil Defense Needed

"Civil Defense is much like obtaining an insurance policy against an event which may never occur," Yturri pointed out. "But the cost of the premium is minor, compared to the costs involved if such insurance protection were not available."

Sen. Yturri said the governor and Republican legislators also will object to "unreasonable" curtailments in the field of "treatment and consideration of the aged in Oregon. They have already been too long ignored."

He feels the problem can be handled by the legislature and state agencies, without turning to the federal government.

"Aside from these three areas, Republicans will fully support all reasonable reductions and cuts in the budget," Yturri said.

He predicts no "drastic tax changes or increases," but he is "fearful the legislature will resort to so-called one-shot revenue measures, which will not solve the basic problems at all."

Broad Tax Base Needed

"Our true function," he said, "is to create a broad-based income tax program with retention of as many deductions as possible, and yet provide a basis so that our future—as well as our present-day—problems can be met."

Ways and Means Committees Take Hard Look at Budgets of Agencies, Services

This legislature is taking a thorough look at existing state programs and services, proposed additions to those already in operation, and suggested new ones.

Attendance at meetings of Joint Ways and Means subcommittees going over budgets of state agencies is being revealed by agency heads required to justify every cent of expenditure for both existing programs, proposed additions to them and requested new programs.

This is as it should be. Oregon is often referred to as a high service state. Therefore, the need to examine budgets critically is even more necessary.

Business organizations, non-profit agencies and state service departments sometimes grow larger by the very nature of their activities. Some of the growth is desirable and fulfills the original purpose for which the agency was established. When this is shown to be the case Ways and Means is satisfied. When an agency cannot defend its existing or expanded operation Ways and Means eliminates it.

The really tough decision facing the committee is what action to take when, based upon need and service, it appears that long-established agencies should be eliminated.

"Demonstration" Libraries

Here is an example of other things related to this discussion:

We learn through attendance at Ways and Means sessions that the state library is nearing the end of a five-year program of "demonstration" libraries it has set up and operated in rural areas. Federal funds and state funds together have provided the financial backing for the ventures. No local financial effort has been required.

Now that the federal-state supported program is coming to an end, the committee finds that in many cases the programs will end with the close of the five-year demonstration period.

If the federal-state program had been conducted with some

double financial contribution no doubt the program would have been transferred to local auspices and the demonstration would have been successful.

Certainly we can say that if these programs die with the close of the five-year federal-state effort that there has been a substantial waste of federal and state funds.

However, it is not too late to correct this problem. With the leadership of legislators who will return to their homes while these programs are still in operation, the demonstration programs can be the foundation for fine rural library service.

EDUCATIONAL TV

For those who are within the range of educational TV channels 7 and 10, a weekly legislative news round-up of top quality is available. This is "Capital Close-up" seen each Friday evening at 8:30.

The educational TV and radio budget is also undergoing close scrutiny in a Ways and Means subcommittee.

Federal matchings funds are available for extension of the network, one of the prime needs of the system. The whole state is entitled to the educational and cultural services that the Oregon education network provides.

Involved in the study of services now provided and under consideration is closed-circuit educational programs for elementary and secondary schools and continued experimentation in how state-operated TV can be best used as both a higher education and an elementary and secondary educational medium.

This writer is sure of one thing. The general viewer service provided by channels 7 and 10 in its evening programs have proved the need to maintain this network. There is constant improvement, variety, and consistent high quality.
