

City Seeks Federal Sewer Funds

The city council Tuesday night adopted two resolutions that are the first steps towards definite plans for construction of a city sewer system. The resolutions were to file applications for federal grants to aid in financing under the Accelerated Public Works Program.

One application goes first to the State Water Control Agency for their approval and recommendation on project priority. This application requests a federal grant in the amount of \$134,875 for the construction of the sewerage treatment plant, pumping stations and interceptors.

The second application which goes directly to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, requests federal aid in the amount of \$253,000 to be used in the construction of sanitary sewers and house laterals.

The funds sought in both requests represent 50 per cent of the estimated costs of their respective phases of the project. Estimates include a total of \$57,000 in contingencies and interest during construction.

Ways and means of coming up with the balance of the project costs were not discussed because, so it was stated, there would be ample time when, and if, the grants are approved. General obligation bonds, sewer hookups and assessments will be possible appropriation measures.

BUDGET HEARING

No protests were heard against the city budget and the council passed a motion to levy taxes in the amount of \$26,671 to bring the total adopted budget to \$106,667, as published. A question was raised by Don Dewey concerning the method used in determining salary raises. He was told that some were scheduled and the rest were asked for by employees and granted.

In other business the council settled a complaint on water and sewer charges by Johnny O'Hara with a reading of the water rates ordinance.

Informed Harry Strahan that reduced summer water rates were effective during June, July and August.

Moved to buy a roller for street work at a cost of \$175.

Adopted the county court's statement of policy concerning the allocation of county general road funds to incorporated cities in the county. It was reported that Port Orford will receive \$6,192 for street paving from the county during the 1963-64 fiscal year, providing they submit a master plan of street projects.

Purchased a monthly meeting notice on the community calendar from the Quarterback Club at a cost of \$3.

Donated \$50 to the July 4th Celebration fireworks fund.

Paid bills in the amount of \$4,244.15.
