Tax Refunds in Savings Bonds, If You Desire

Taxpayers are reminded of the plan allowing them to take their tax refunds in United States Savings Bonds, by A. G. Erickson, Director of the Internal Revenue Service, for Oregon.

Eligible taxpayers will be given the opportunity of taking their refunds in Series E Savings Bonds, in addition to the Standard options of cash or applying the refund to next year's tax. When Savings Bonds are chosen, the smallest possible number of the highest denomination bonds will be issued, along with a check to cover any remaining balance of a dollar or more.

The idea of allowing a taxpayer to choose between Savings Bonds and a check is not new. Taxpayers have been recommending it for years. What enabled the Treasury to offer it was the recent installation of high-speed data processing equipment to handle tax returns. The Treasury also conducted a survey of taxpayers to determine their interest in a Savings Bonds refund. A significant number of those questioned said they would take their tax refunds in Series E Bonds if given the option.

The tax forms—1040 (long) and 1040A (short)—have been changed to provide an extra space in which taxpayers may elect U.S. Savings Bonds for their refunds. Information on the option appears in the instructions for both of these forms.

Horticulturists' Short Course Set

An ornamental short course will be held at Oregon State University in Corvallis Feb. 3, 4, 5, for florists, nurserymen, bulb growers and holly orchardists, landscape gardeners and Christmas tree growers.

Many Easter lily bulb growers plan to attend the session for bulb growers where scientists will discuss results of work conducted at the Pacific Bulb Growers research and development station at Harbor, according to Lou Oester, county extension agent. Growers will also have an opportunity to see the greenhouse experiments being conducted with bulbs from Curry county.

Bulb growers will meet Feb. 3, while landscape gardeners and holly orchardists will meet Feb. 4. The Feb. 5 session will be for nurserymen and Christmas tree growers. Each group will have individual meetings.

This is an excellent opportunity for individuals interested in growing and marketing ornamentals to obtain the latest results of research, according to Oester.

Alien Filing Deadline Near

Portland, Oregon, January 20, 1964, District Director Alfred J. Urbano of the Immigration and Naturalization Service reminded aliens in Oregon today that Friday, January 31, is the deadline for filing address reports as required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

The Immigration official urged aliens who have not yet filed their address reports to do so no later than January 31 to avoid possible penalties.

Failure to comply with the requirements can mean a fine, jail sentence and deportation for a willful violation.

Mr. Urbano said the law requires that every alien except those having diplomatic status, representatives of certain international organizations and persons admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers must file the address report during January of each year at the nearest Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office.
