



## IDENTIFICATION MADE Body Recovered; One Still Lost

Positive identification was made Wednesday of the body of John Walker, 54, Bandon, the victim of a boating accident at the mouth of the Rogue River. He was skipper of the Northwind, a commercial fishing and crabbing boat, that capsized in an attempt to cross the Rogue River bar January 26.

The body was found Friday, January 31, on the beach about one-half mile south of the Gold Beach city limits. Identification was made from fingerprints by the State Bureau of Identification and Investigation.

A second victim of the Sunday tragedy, Ray Jones, 40, Gold Beach, a part-time helper on the Northwind, has not yet been found, according to the Curry county sheriff's office.

## Curry CC Group Sets Projects

The first meeting of the Curry County Chamber of Commerce Committee was held at Gold Beach last Thursday with 11 Chamber of Commerce members from the three chambers in the county in attendance.

Purpose of the committee is to develop a plan for advertising and promoting the county to aid the tourist and recreation industry.

The committee discussed many projects and promotional ideas but agreed upon three important ones to develop at present. These were:

1. Seeing that a sign is placed north of Crescent City to encourage travel on highway 101 north;
2. Develop a plan of radio advertising in Southern Oregon to encourage off-season travel;
3. Develop an inexpensive county brochure.

Members of the committee will gather information on the three projects and meet again on Feb. 13 to develop definite plans for the projects.

## Lack of Funds Is Problem of North Curry TV

One of the greatest problems facing North Curry Recreation, Inc., is lack of the funds necessary to meet current bills and to comply with FCC regulations, the organization's treasurer said today.

North Curry operates and maintains the TV translator system on Coast Guard Hill.

The organization was formed with the understanding that all persons receiving television reception from the system would contribute membership dues of \$10 per year for operating expenses. So far, less than 100 persons are trying to support the translator for the entire town, N.C.R. said, with only six persons paid up for 1964.

## Deadline For Filing Noted

Candidates for nomination in the 1964 Oregon Primary Election must have filing completed by 5 p. m. Mar. 6, according to Curry County Clerk, B. I. Mathers.

Those filing for county offices, district offices (such as Port Commissioner) within a county, or precinct offices within a county must file with the county clerk.

Filing is by declaration or by petition.

Filing by declaration for county office nomination requires a \$20 filing fee (the fee for filing for Port Commissioner is \$5).

Filing for precinct committee-man or committeewoman is by declaration only, but on these no filing fee is required.

In using the petition method a preliminary filing must be made in the clerk's office before commencing to circulate petition forms for signatures.

This is done by filing a signed copy of the form, then when the signatures are completed they are filed with the original filing form.

Signatures must be obtained from 5 precincts within the county.

A petition for Democratic party nomination requires 56 signatures and for Republican, 48 signatures. As these signatures must be checked and certified by the county clerk as those of registered electors affiliated with the same political party as the candidate, they should be presented considerably before the deadline to allow for last minute rush.

It is advised that women be cautioned to sign as registered—for example, "Mary" Smith rather than "Mrs. John" Smith.
