

Man Killed In Pick-up Truck Accident Monday

Iva Bryant Johnson, 49, of Nesika Beach, was killed Monday when his light truck collided with a loaded logging truck at the Nesika Beach intersection about 10:18 a.m.

According to the Curry county sheriff's office, Johnson, the father of 11 children, had reportedly stopped his pick-up at the intersection as a logging truck was approaching from the south, then moved out into the path of the loaded truck just as it reached the crossroads.

The impact literally tore the pick-up apart, rolling the cab end up and wedging it under the truck. Two wreckers and deputies worked until about noon to remove the body and clear away the debris.

Driver of the truck, Ronald Edward Owen, was reportedly not injured.

Port Race

With three seats open this fall on the Port of Port Orford commission, Democrats had no trouble selecting their candidates, only two ran, Ira Tucker polled 340 votes and Jim Vincent, 239.

Republicans had four men seeking the nomination, Ray Reinke tabbed 191, Frank St. Clair, 177, and Harry Strahan, 176. The fourth man, Carlos White had 100.

Chapman Holds Senate Return

Incumbent State Senator Richard Chapman came out the winner over his Democrat opponent Dave Philpott in his bid to return to the senate.

Curry county gave Philpott the nod with 1,114 to Chapman's 733 votes but Coos county voters proved their strength and gave Chapman over a 500 vote lead in the two county totals.

Chapman will face Republican Ed Chandler in November. Chandler was not opposed in the primary.

Dog Control Law Passes

Curry county dogs suffered a defeat in that they will now have to be controlled. Livestock, flowers, gardens and lawns, however, are expected to benefit.

The dog control measure, Shall Dogs Continue to Run at Large in Curry County, passed with a whopping 2,188 No votes to 1,259 Yes.

Though some voters may have been confused at the wording of the measure, it was according to legislative requirements.

Timeus Opposes Bill Campbell

Heck Timeus of Pistol River eased by four other candidates to win the Democrat nomination for Curry's second big race, county commissioner. Timeus captured 706 votes to beat out Fred Flynn, next high with 456.

Incumbent Bill Campbell garnered the majority of Republican votes, 458, in the four-man race for the commissioner nomination. Next high was Ben Martin with 307.

McWilliams Is Victor In Changing Hot Race

At least one contest in the county, and probably the state, failed to end at the close of election Friday... it wasn't over until late Tuesday after many hours of canvassing.

That was the up and down race for county assessor nomination

on the Democrat ticket between John (Red) McWilliams, Port Orford, and Harry Hedderly of Gold Beach.

Final count of the votes put McWilliams over the top by a slim nine vote lead, 879 to Hedderly's 870.

First tabulation of results from 19 of 21 precincts put McWilliams ahead 633 to 515 at the close of the polls. Then, complete unofficial returns from all precincts put Hedderly in the lead by a two point margin. During counting of absentee ballots, McWilliams moved ahead again but the count finally wound up a tie vote, 870-870.

County clerk B. L. Mather said, however, that when final canvass of votes was completed Tuesday afternoon McWilliams came out the victor.

Hedderly conceded the election at 6 p.m. Tuesday in a telephone call to McWilliams. In November McWilliams will face Republican Charles Fitzhugh, present chief deputy assessor. Fitzhugh chased by Ray Keen, 763 to 530, to win the nomination.

Robert Miller Defeats Wallace; Meets Ed Ackley In November

Robert Miller, incumbent Curry county district attorney, tallied up an easy two and a half to one plurality over his lone opponent William Wallace of Gold Beach for the Democrat nomination.

Final county gave Miller a 1,365 vote to Wallace's 576. Miller will meet Republican Ed Ackley of Brookings in the November election. Ackley, unopposed, pulled 552 votes.

Duncan Victory

Curry county voters showed their confidence, along with the rest of the Fourth District, in incumbent Congressman Robert Duncan and gave him a two to one vote over former congressman Charles Porter.

District-wide, Duncan polled over 27,000 votes to Porter's less than 19,000. Curry county gave Duncan 1,273 to Porter's 630.

On the Republican side, Paul Jaffarian eased by his opponent, Mrs. Florence Waggener, with 25,066 to 17,683 unofficial returns.

In Curry county, Jaffarian pulled 614 votes to Waggener's 557.

Back, McKenzie

Incumbent 17th District Rep. Carl Back will meet Republican Rod McKenzie in the November contest for the house seat. Neither were opposed in Friday's primary.

Curry county voters gave Back 1,613 votes. McKenzie racked up 1,199.

Betty Bigelow Wins State BPW Office At Portland

Mrs. Edwin (Betty) Bigelow of the local B.P.W. Club was elected State Legislation Chairman of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs at the state convention held May 15-16-17 at the Portland Hilton Hotel. Mrs. Bigelow, together with other newly elected state officers and chairmen, was installed at a formal banquet Saturday night.

Legislation is a vital part of the B.P.W. program. (The individual clubs, State Federations and the National Federation's legislative programs are implemented by sponsoring and supporting appropriate legislation and administrative action.) Primary concern is legislation safe-guarding the rights and accomplishments of women, by discouraging discriminatory practices, and by improving the status of women, and legislation affecting the Nation's well-being.

The three day conclave opened with a Hawaiian theme dinner on Friday where the candidates were presented, and ended with a breakfast honoring past state presidents on Sunday morning. Principal speaker for the convention was Miss Hazel Palmer of Sedalia, Mo., a past president of the National Federation, lawyer and member of the American Bar Association.

Others attending from Port Orford besides Mrs. Bigelow were, Geneva Tucker, Anna Thomas and Maude Weir, delegates, and Pat Starr alternate delegate.
