

BPW Hear Dr. Van Loan

The Business Professional Women's club of Port Orford met Tuesday evening at Orford's for a regular business meeting.

Members were extended an invitation to attend a meeting in North Bend Feb. 13. The proposed breakwater for the Port Orford harbor with its bill for adequate funds had been introduced to Congress that day and members asked that "a congratulatory letter" be sent the Congressmen for their efforts.

Dr. Lillian Van Loan Is Guest Speaker

Mrs. Anna Thomas introduced Dr. Lillian Van Loan, psychologist and counselor at the Southwestern Oregon College in North Bend, who spoke to the group of "Women and Their Role in Life."

"The concept is that women have fallen short of their potentials," said Mrs. Van Loan who pointed out that many are doing great things, but since 1920 too many women have taken the easy way out and at the present time are only using 10% of their potential.

She went on to say that it has been proven that women are physically stronger than men, although statistics show 90% of the psychos in mental hospitals are women.

Women are not adjusting; there was a time when most elementary schools had women principals but with increased pay, men have taken these positions over, and not conceding that men are more intelligent or better qualified. She went on to say that if the world is going to get better, women will have to play a larger part and the place to start is here.

To fill our minds with trivial things is not enough—demand dividends! "Labor-saving devices with more time for fluff—that better be left under the bed!"

"The great waste in America today is that women's brains are being wasted. People should be judged on their merit and not their sex. Men are getting positions every day where women are really better qualified," said Mrs. Van Loan.

"The body may tire but one cannot fatigue the brain and it is a pity if women go to bed at night and haven't learned at least one new thing during the day. The greatest difficulty with women and their health is their dissatisfaction with life. They are content to say 'yes' to their children who too soon realize that the 'mother is living in them.' Only when women have high standards do their children have success and are able to accomplish success. In any country where the women are degenerate, the country is down and unsuccessful."
