

Billfold Recovered After Twenty Years

Mrs. Jack McLeod of Gold Beach must have been relieved recently when a mysterious find did not turn out to be as gruesome as she expected.

Rogue River Sand and Gravel Co. was taking gravel from a source about 1 1/2 miles up Pistol River road when one of the men found a billfold. Jack brought the wallet home and it was discovered in the Jeep by his wife. The dates on the contents caused her great alarm and she contacted the sheriff's office. That office radioed Lane County in an attempt to locate the owner, but the offices were closed on Saturday. Mrs. McLeod decided to do some calling on her own.

She called the operator at Eugene and asked that they check the telephone lists in surrounding towns. Surely enough at Cottage Grove the name Harold L. Landers was listed. When Mrs. McLeod called him, he had a "Yes" answer

to all her questions: "Yes, his name was Harold Leroy Landers"; "Yes, his father's name was Kent Landers"; "Yes, he formerly lived at Creswell"; "Yes, he lost a billfold 20 years ago"—between Creswell and Eugene, as he was going to see Dorothy Harris, the girl he planned to (and did) marry, Mrs. Walter Cram's niece.

What a relief to Mrs. McLeod who was afraid they would have to start sifting the gravel for a body missing for 20 years! How did the wallet travel from near Eugene to the wilds of Curry County, and where had it been, enroute? It was in good shape, the papers inside were legible, in fact, in such condition that it could not have lain out in rain and wet weather for any length of time.

Whoever found it in the first place had removed only the \$90 in bills; the papers, pictures, credit cards, etc. remained intact. It is to be hoped that persons needed those dollars worse than that young man who was counting his nickels and dimes in preparation for starting married life.

How the billfold travelled over 200 miles and appeared 20 years later in good condition will no doubt remain a mystery, because the person who could tell the story will not come forward, since honesty is apparently not one of his (or her) virtues.

The story does not end unhappily, because Harold had long ago given up ever seeing that billfold, and Mrs. McLeod was only happy to know that the young man whose name was on the contents was alive and well,

only in the scoring, but not in the actual play.

Opening event in the tournament is the Master's Pairs Championship at 1:30 p.m. Friday. The Men's and Women's Pairs Championships are set for Friday night, beginning at 8 o'clock. Saturday is the day of the Open Pairs event, as well as the special Fortuna Pairs.

The tournament closes Sunday, with the Mixed Pairs Championships at 1 p.m. and the Team of Four Championship at 7 p.m.

In the world of tournament

bridge, the sectional ranks as one of the three most important bridge tournaments. The national championships, the most important event, are held three times a year and this November will be held in San Francisco.

More than 300 north coast bridge players are expected to compete in the Eureka tournament to be held at the Eureka Woman's Club, 1531 J Street.
