Military Schools Seek Teachers

Department of Defense Dependents Schools System overseas will again be recruiting for some 2000 teachers to staff Army, Air Force and Navy Dependents Schools throughout the world for the 1966-67 school year.

Basic qualifications will require applicants to have a bachelor's degree, 18 semester hours of professional teacher education, 2 years of successful full-time teacher or administrative experience by June of 1966, be at least 21 years of age and a citizen of the United States.

Elementary teachers particularly will be in great demand. Secondary teachers, librarians, counselors, teachers of physically handicapped, mentally retarded and remedial reading will also be in demand.

The basic school year salary is \$4835. In addition, employees receive free government quarters, if available, or a housing allowance for local economy housing. An additional post differential from 10 to 25% is paid in some areas. Transportation costs plus expenses enroute are paid by the United States Government.

Schools are located in the following areas: Iceland, Labrador, Newfoundland, Bermuda, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, Trinidad, Azores, Korea, Japan, Okinawa, Philippine Islands, Taiwan, Midway, England, Scotland, France, Germany, Italy, Sicily, Spain, the Netherlands, Norway, Denmark, Crete, Libya, Turkey, Asmara, Ethiopia, Morocco, Pakistan.

Library Lowdown

Women have often desired to follow the path of adventure and freedom. Today some do. Fifty years ago women seldom left the security of home, yet Alan Burgess has told an exciting true story of "The Lovely Sergeant" recently received by the City Library.

Gentle Flora Sandes was the daughter of a British rector, educated in a fine finishing school in Switzerland, she rebelled against the confining restrictions imposed upon women of her class. She yearned for excitement and adventure.

In 1914 at the outbreak of the Serbian War, Flora volunteered as a Red Cross nurse. She arrived in time to be of service in a typhus epidemic where she attended the wounded and sick and even performed amputations. She finally contracted the disease and almost died.

When the British were evacuated, she persuaded the Serbian army to enlist her as a private. For the next few years she fought with the Serbian men through fierce fighting.

She was twice decorated for bravery in action and was once badly wounded by a grenade. Loved and respected, she proved an undeniable inspiration to the men in her unit.

Bank Proposes Stock Dividend

Ralph J. Voss, president of the First National Bank of Oregon, has announced that the Board of Directors of the bank has proposed the payment of a 25% stock dividend.

The proposal which is subject to the approval of the Comptroller of the Currency will be submitted to the shareholders of the bank at their annual meeting Feb. 22. If approved, the stock dividend will be paid on or about April 1 to shareholders of record at the close of business on March 15, 1966.

According to Voss, it is anticipated that the Board will establish a regular annual dividend rate of \$1.80 per share on the total shares outstanding after payment of the stock dividend. This is equivalent to \$2.25 on existing shares and compares with the current rate of \$2.20 per share which was increased from \$2.00 per share in the third quarter of 1965.

This proposed stock dividend will be the third to be distributed by the bank in the past five years. The earlier stock dividends consisted of 12 1/2% in 1961 and 20% in 1964.
