But all human attempts to secure the grave against disturbances will be of no avail for the day will come when man will hear the voice of Him who conquered death and every man will then come forth from his resting place.

Doeth death end it all? There are those that would like to believe that God is dead. If God is dead then death is dead for man cannot even die without a Power that controls death.
