Returns From Summer School

The dust created by the mass exodus of students at the end of spring term hardly had time to settle on the Oregon State University campus before more than 1880 4-H members began to arrive June 13 to stir it up again. The occasion was the 51st annual 4-H Club Summer School, one of the largest of its kind in the nation.

According to Burton Hutton, State 4-H leader, 4-H members ranging in age from 13 to 19 spent five days at OSU attending classes and participating in special activities. The youths represented every county in Oregon and all attended on scholarships provided by business concerns, organizations and interested individuals.

Purpose of this school, Hutton said, is to supplement regular 4-H projects in agriculture and home economics and give members a broader view of career opportunities. Classes were offered in such areas as leadership, communications, financial planning for education, music, art, food engineering science, home economics, forest science and town and country business.

The theme of this year's summer school was the Lewis and Clark Expedition. General assemblies attended by all 4-H'ers included such programs as the OSU music department's "Names of Oregon"; selections and talks by Rube Long and E. R. Jackman, Oregon historians; Dr. Lillian Van Loan, Coordinator of Women's Programs for the Division of Continuing Education, and Dr. Morgan Odell, president Emeritus of Lewis and Clark College.

Evening activities included a barbecue, an American fiesta, jamborees, a banker's night program, track meet and a talent show. One of the highlights of the evening programs, according to Jim Ross, Curry County Extension Agent, was the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner" by a group of International Farm Youth Exchange delegates, many of whom could not speak a word of English. They represented such countries as Japan, Finland, Ecuador, India, New Zealand and Germany.

While at 4-H summer school the youngsters were supervised by volunteer 4-H leaders, county extension agents, and college-age counselors.
