IT'S YOUR LAW Contributory Negligence

A large crack developed in the sidewalk in front of Jones' grocery store, Jones told two of his carry-out boys to chip away the broken pavement and fill the hole with fresh concrete. They worked at it during the afternoon, and at quitting time had the hole chipped out but were not ready to pour in the fresh concrete. So they put a sawhorse over the hole and left it.

Early in the evening, while it was still light, Mrs. Smith came walking down the sidewalk. She was watching two children throwing a ball across the street, so she did not see the sawhorse or the hole in the sidewalk. She stepped in the hole, turned her ankle, and fell and broke her nose and leg.

Mrs. Smith sued Jones. "He dug a pitfall right in the middle of the sidewalk," she said. "There was a sawhorse over the hole," said Jones. "She would not have fallen if she had paid the slightest attention to where she was going."

The jury decided in favor of Jones. It found that he was negligent in leaving a hole in the sidewalk with only a sawhorse over it to warn the public. But, it said, Mrs. Smith would have seen the sawhorse if she had been watching where she was going. Her own negligence was as much the cause of her injury as was the negligence of Jones.

In general, people are liable if their negligence causes injury to others. But everyone is bound to exercise reasonable care for his own safety. A pedestrian cannot simply walk along with head head in the clouds, paying no attention to traffic, the condition of the sidewalk, or other possible hazards.

If an injured person's own negligence contributed to his injury, he cannot hold another liable for damages. This is known in law as the doctrine of contributory negligence.

In short, each of us is expected to use some good sense to take care of himself.

Citation Received For Outdoor Film

For its film titled "Reel Fun in Oregon," the Oregon State Highway Department has been awarded a special citation of merit in the 1965 National Outdoor Travel Film Festival, it was announced last week by Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer.

Earnings Hit Record High

Average hourly earnings for Oregon industrial production workers hit a new record high at \$3.07 in May, resulting in a sustained record average weekly earnings of \$126.18 and the highest weekly earnings ever paid to contract construction workers at \$177.79, according to J. N. Peet, commissioner, Department of Employment, Salem.

The record hourly earnings compared to the former record of \$3.06 set in April and to a statewide average weekly earnings of \$120.29 in May, 1965, and to a weekly average of \$162.81 paid to contract construction workers in May, 1965.

Lumber and wood products workers as a whole in May received an average of \$130.20 per week and an hourly earnings of \$3.10 and worked an average of 42 hours per week. Contract construction, by far, paid the highest average weekly earnings to production workers in May and second highest to primary metals workers at \$141.78. Average hourly earnings for contract construction workers was \$4.63 per hour and for primary metals workers, \$3.40. Construction workers were employed an average of 38.4 hours per week in May, compared to 37.6 hours per week in May of last year.

Among durable goods industries, veneer and plywood workers in the lumber and wood products category, continued to be paid the highest average weekly earnings at \$132.31 and an average hourly wage of \$2.98, working an average of 44.4 hours per week. Paper and allied products workers were paid an average of \$135.38 per week and \$3.27 per hour, but worked an average of 41.4 hours per week in May, the Department of Employment report indicated.

What causes a refrigerator to accumulate frost rapidly? If it's the manual defrost type, check these points. Is the door seal tight or does the gasket need replacement? Is the door opened often, especially in hot weather? Are warm or hot foods put in the refrigerator? Are liquids or moist foods stored uncovered? Any of these will add to the frost problem. Warm air can hold more moisture than cool, so more moisture enters the refrigerator to collect as frost.
