Killed In Vietnam

Memorial services were held Sunday at Beaverton Christian Church for Lance Cpl. Ronald L. Longanecker, 8030 Failing St., Portland.

Cpl. Longanecker, A Co., 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion, U.S. Marine Corps, was killed in action in Vietnam July 8. He was riding in a helicopter on an aerial assault in hostile territory when the helicopter was shot down by enemy fire, the Marine Corps reported. The aircraft crashed and burned, killing others aboard. Cpl. Longanecker's body was not recovered, although patrols fought their way to the site to conduct a thorough search, the parents were notified.

Cpl. Longanecker was born Aug. 13, 1947, in Las Vegas. He moved to Portland with his family about 11 years ago and attended Sunset and Garden Home grade schools and Sunset High School before graduating from Madison August, 1965, and went to Vietnam in January of this year. He was a member of the elite recon Marines, equivalent to the Army Special forces.

He is survived by his parents, a sister Connie, 16, and brother Stan, 14, both at home; a grandmother, Mrs. Burleigh Smith, Lebanon, and a grandfather, Len C. Longanecker Sr. of Oroville, Calif. Longanecker also was a nephew of John Bruchler, Langlois; cousin of Mrs. Gerald Kamph of Langlois and Gary Bruchler, Coos Bay.

Early Sawmill And Crew

WAY BACK in about 1906 sawmills were also a good part of the local economic picture. This one, owned by Amus Adolphsen, was located up the Elk River, in front of the present Western States Plywood and about where the Gordon Forty home is. And like a good many of the mills in the early days, employees could bunk and eat at mill-owned facilities right on the premises. In rear of the mill is the water tank where water was flumed from a small creek to run the steam engine. Lumber from this mill was hauled to the Port Orford dock for shipment by Al Marsh, with a four-horse team, and Ace Carney's five-mule team.
