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Still No Firearms Legislation . . .

By LANS LENEVE As of this date, no firearms legislation—good or bad—has moved out of the U. S. Senate Judiciary Committee. No one knows when Congress will adjourn but current rumors in Washington indicate that Congress will stay in session past the middle of October. We are well aware of the interest of all firearm owners concerning the action that will possibly be taken concerning the passing of an anti-firearms bill, such as proposed by Senator Dodd of Connecticut and sanctioned by President Johnson. When a radical such as Dodd and a slick politician such as LBJ join forces, most anything could happen.

KNOW YOUR SHOTGUN—Too many bird hunters seldom go to the trouble of ascertaining the actual shooting ability of their shotguns. They purchase a scattergun, seldom pattern it with various sizes of shot that are popular in the field, and in doing so, are often handicapped to a great extent by using shot that does not chamber properly in their fowling pieces.

When the average hunter purchases a new shotgun—one that is supposed to be of either modified or full choke, he takes for granted that the barrel—or barrels—are actually bored to deliver either a full choke or modified pattern. Or, if it happens to be a repeating shotgun of either pump-action or automatic type, that the barrel is marked full-choke—as such guns usually are—that they should prove to be a close shooting gun, that such a weapon should deliver a dense pattern of shot, one of a far denser nature than would be registered by a gun with modified bore shooting the same load.

This writer has owned shotguns during the past year that were equipped with modified barrels that shot a full-choke pattern when certain sizes of shot were used. We have also owned such guns that were supposed to be full choked, that would scatter shot of a certain size, in the same manner of a modified choke or open barreled gun. So it behooves the shot-gunner to pattern his gun with various sizes of shot in order that he may ascertain the exact size that is really adaptable to his gun.

It is well to bear in mind that choke markings on a barrel can be confusing since ammunition varies greatly. Really, it is the fault of the ammo, not that of the barrel that is responsible for both choke-barrels and modified chokes to fail to deliver the shot pattern that they are supposed to register. Conversely such patterns registered by a modified choke may conflict to a great extent in the performance of their duties when the wrong-sized shot

is being used. Tight patterns may be shot by modified barrels while using certain brands of ammo and a certain shot size.

AS TO PATTERNING Patterning a shotgun isn't hard, but it takes time. Tack up a piece of paper about four feet square and mark a bulls-eye in the center of it. Measure off 40 yards, aim at the bulls-eye, and shoot. Then encircle a 30-inch circle to include the most pellet holes and count them. One pattern means nothing; five will give you a fair average, but 10 is better. Be sure to count the number of pellet holes in each individual target. Most any ammunition handbook will give you the number of pellets in a shell, but if you haven't got one, cut up one and count the pellets it contains. It may take a lot of experimenting, but sooner or later you'll come up with just the right combination of shell type and size of shot for good, solid patterns. That is, if you don't go broke during the experiment, due to the outlandish price of shotgun shells today.

This scribe has fired every brand of ammo on the market today and during many past years, and finds that the plastic shells of today produce tighter patterns than those of the older paper shells.

SHOTGUN RANGE It must be remembered that a shotgun's killing range is largely controlled and regulated by the degree of choke present in the barrel or barrels. It should also be borne in mind that despite the fond claims to the contrary, a shotgun is far from being a cannon, and is basically a 40 to 50-yard weapon and any game bird shot beyond that distance is likely to be downed a crippled bird being beyond reasonable firing range. If all bird hunters would bear this in mind, it would prove of great benefit to both the welfare of the birds themselves, and would also serve to curb a needless waste of ammo for the hunter.

Red Devils Sink Pirates

Pacific fell to the Coquille Red Devils, 20-0, for their second straight conference loss of the season Friday night, Oct. 7.

After a Coquille-dominated first half, in which the Devils turned into a near rout, the game suddenly changed into a defensive battle. In the second half Pirate defense recovered four enemy fumbles, forced one punt, and cooled a fiery Devil attack five yards short of pay dirt. On the other hand, after an already stubborn first half, the Devil defense forced the Pirates to punt no less than six times during the final two periods.

Pacific's offensive unit came within a hair of being shut out entirely by the Coquille defense, and could muster only eight yards total net offense. The Pirates running game, gaining a meager 15 yards up to the third quarter, was even more humbled by a 49 yards net rushing embarrassment in the final period.

Arnie Johnson, Pacific's starting sophomore quarterback, managed to complete two passes to senior end Mike McWilliams for a total of 12 yards, however, to save the offense from being entirely shut out.

Coquille, compiling 204 yards net offense during the first half alone, was paced by four backs averaging over 5.0 yards per carry. Bill Head, a 142 pound Devil halfback, led all ball carriers with a 12.6 yards average per carry, after his tricky 57 yard romp through the Pirate line. Head was followed by Jim Hickam, with a 5.4 average. Rob Wakefield with 5.1 yards per carry, and Richard Marineau with 5.0. Together these four backs accounted for 220 yards on rushing alone.
