Fire Losses High In Oregon Forests

The U. S. Forest Service reports that it was a bad fire year in the National Forests of Oregon where acreage burned was seven times the amount blackened in 1965.

Nearly 11,000 acres of Forest Service-protected lands were hit by fire this year, with 6,200 acres burned over in one fire in the Fremont National Forest in Paisley in August.

The total number of fires was less this year in both man-caused and lightning categories. Total number of acres burned in 1966 was 10,864, compared to 1,507 the previous year, in spite of the fact that there were fewer fires. . . . with 1,022 reported in 1966 and 1,230 in 1965.

Of this year's fires, 463 were thought to be man-caused and 559 were set by lightning.

Accident Tips

If you are involved in a traffic accident, what should you do? Chief Harold P. Hight of the Port Orford Police Department had these reminders for Oregon motorists.

"The most important thing for a person to do is to be concerned about the other vehicles surrounding his own accident," the chief said. "Check for injuries and see to their car. Attempt to direct traffic around the scene

to prevent other cars from becoming involved."

Oregon law requires that anyone involved in an accident must stop and remain at the scene until he has fulfilled certain requirements. If injured parties are present, reasonable attention must be shown to them to prevent further injury or possible death.

"Never move an injured party at the scene of an accident," chief Hight commented. "You should move them out of im-

mediate danger but transportation and extensive medical treatment should be left to those who are trained for the job."

Other duties and obligations outlined by Chief Hight were (1) the drivers of all vehicles involved should exchange information regarding names, addresses, license numbers and insurance companies. State law also requires that an official accident report form must be filed by the drivers of the accident within 24 hours. (2) if there are

witnesses present either in your car or at the scene, obtain their names and see that other parties concerned receive them also. "Every fact you can obtain at the scene will make the task of preparing your accident report that much easier," Hight noted. "No matter how you look at it, becoming involved in a traffic accident is bad business. Inconvenience is always the aftermath of even the most minor

accident and more often, pain, suffering and heavy medical expenses stem from a traffic accident," continued the chief. "The best policy is to operate your car in such a manner as not to become involved in an accident. If the accident does occur, remember to stay calm and think before you do anything. Too often, hasty decisions or actions can result in serious complications.
